## R. F. C. AGENT HERE FRIDAY TO CONFER ON COUNTY RELIEF

Word to Court Says Field Representative of Federal Branch Coming to Discuss Local Situation

Word was received by the county court this morning, that C. W. Reynolds, field representative of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for relief would arrive here Thursday evening and desired to confer with the county court Friday morning, on the local situation.

Reynolds has been visiting other sections of the state, discussing with county heads their local situations.

The telegram from Reynolds, reads as follows:

"Will arrive in Medford Thursday evening and will arrange conference to discuss matters relative to a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, for Friday morning at 8:30 o'clock in your office."

Similar steps, according to press dispatches the past ten days, have been taken in other sections of the northwest.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Appropriation of an additional \$150,000,000 for direct relief loans to states was recommended to a senate committee today by Charles A. Miller, president of the Reconstruction Corporation.

The R. F. C. president endorsed in general terms the Wagner bill to liberalize the law under which his organization administers relief, testifying the demand for aid is increasing.

He opposed, however, the provision proposing to throw wide open the entire resources of the corporation for relief loans to states, saying it would handicap efforts to stimulate local relief work.

Miller testified the present \$300,000,000 fund would last until June and that an additional \$150,000,000 "would carry us through to the long season in December."

## HULL SLATED FOR SECRETARY STATE IS UNDERSTANDING

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Senator Hull of Tennessee, regarded now as the most probable choice for secretary of state, went into joint conference here today with President-elect Roosevelt, and Professor Raymond Moley on war debts.

After the meeting he departed for Washington, still maintaining silence on whether he had formally accepted an offer to be the next secretary of state. His non-committal attitude was interpreted, however, as showing a receptive mood and the gray-haired senator was put down in the unofficial cabinet list.

Hull, an authority on tariff, spent the night here with Mr. Roosevelt. One of the first moves of the new

democratic administration will be negotiation of war debt relief asked by the European powers.

Mr. Roosevelt is going to insist on tariff reciprocity agreements and assurances of currency stabilization in return.

He will deal personally with the European debt representatives. He will have by his side, however, his secretary of state. That secretary, therefore, is expected to be an authority on international economics.

Senator Hull is, so is Owen D. Young New York industrialist, but he appears to be out of the situation just now.

SALEM, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Chairman Estes Snedecor of the Multnomah delegation in the legislature will this afternoon appoint a committee of seven delegation members to sift charges growing out of alleged financial irregularities of the port of Portland and out of which grek petition for receivership.

This committee will report to the delegation next Tuesday. This procedure was voted at a delegation meeting today at which it was held after debate that an investigation was a proper function of the delegation.
