Cummings and Jane Sneider gave the final report of the work of the "Sam Hill" highway beautification contest committee announcing a general award of public interest as the most outstanding of the contest and mentioning the plans for a small rest and observation area and a fountain at a scenic point on the highway.

Mrs. L. E. Williams gave a practical talk on the feeding of birds in winter. Incidentally Mrs. Williams explained the process of developing "depression plants," two of which were exhibited at the meeting. The beautiful coral-like growths on pieces of coal or linkers were developed by the use of a solution of six tablespoons each of clear water, table salt, household bluing and one tablespoon of ammonia, poured over the coal in a low bowl, with mercuric iodine, red or green ink, or other coloring fluids dropped in small amounts on the developing crystals to give variety of color.

Miss Willette will present the March program on wild flowers of southern Oregon.
