Thousand Assembled At Central Point for Advent of New Industry — Hearty Co-operation Is Promised.

Coming from all parts of Jackson and Josephine counties, over 1000 people, with a preponderance of dairymen, welcomed the opening of the new Rogue River Cheese & Products company plant at Central Point yesterday afternoon. A feeling of good will, optimism and enthusiasm permeated the assemblage, which gathered at Central Point grange hall at noon, where a free lunch was served.

A delegation of Medford business men brought greetings from this city in behalf of the chamber of commerce, presented on the program by W. S. Bolger, president. Will Aid Conditions "It is indeed a pleasure to welcome to the Rogue River valley a new industry which I earnestly believe is the forerunner of improving conditions in this region, Mr. Bolger told the gathering. "The establishment of the factory is the first important step of recent years to obtain new markets for our wide range of products, bringing into this section new money."

Anderson, Chairman John Anderson, well known granger, acted as chairman of the gathering, and worked tirelessly to make the program a possibility. Confined to his bed for several days due to influenza, C. M. Churchill, manager of the Central Point factory, was unable to be present, but a message from him was read by A. E. Powell, well known publisher of the Central Point American, which published a special cheese edition Friday. The message also came from O. L. Churchill, president of the company and A. S. Page, vice-president, both of whom were out of the valley.

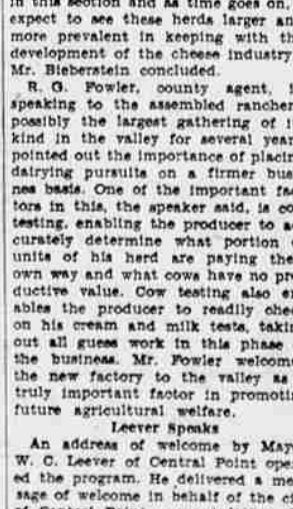

DRUNKEN DRIVE PROVES COSTLY

Arthur G. Adams, 523 Bessie street, was fined \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail Saturday afternoon on a driving while intoxicated charge, by Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman. 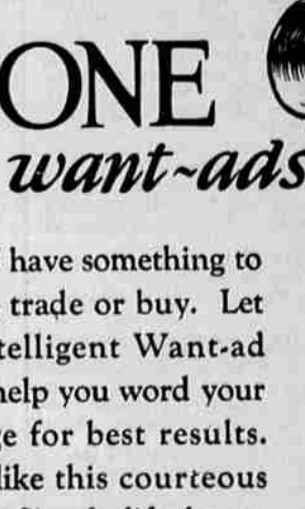
