C. E. RALLY MARKS CLIMAX OF WEEK OF CELEBRATION

Crater Lake Union Enjoys Big Meeting in Phoenix - Elva Caster Makes Main Address - Plans Made.

As a climax to the Christian Endeavor anniversary week, Crater Lake Union held a rally at Phoenix in honor of the birth of Endeavor, February 2, 1881. The rally began with pot-luck dinner at 6:30 with the rally and an executive meeting later in the evening. Jerry Latham, first vice-president, was toastmaster of the banquet.

The rally, having about 150 delegates present, was one of the largest held in the union for some time. One of the surprises of the evening was that of the junior society of Phoenix being awarded the shield. The banner went to the intermediates of Medford.
