

MEDFORD JUNIORS LOSE BOTH TILTS TO PARRISH HIGH

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 4.—(AP)—With the lead changing hands almost every time a field goal was scored in the fourth quarter, Parrish junior high of Salem and Medford junior high basketballers battled to an overtime period in the second game of their series here tonight, but Parrish nosed out, 26 to 25 in the overtime and thus swept the series, having won 38 to 17 last night.

Led by a fiery center, Van Dyke, who scored 21 points including all but one of his team's field goals, the Medford boys showed a lot more class tonight than in the first game. Quesseth, diminutive forward, dropped in the three points that won for Parrish in the overtime.

Parrish led 12 to 8 at the half time, but Medford was ahead 23 to 20 a minute before the end of regular playing time.

In Friday's game Parrish high won 38 to 16.

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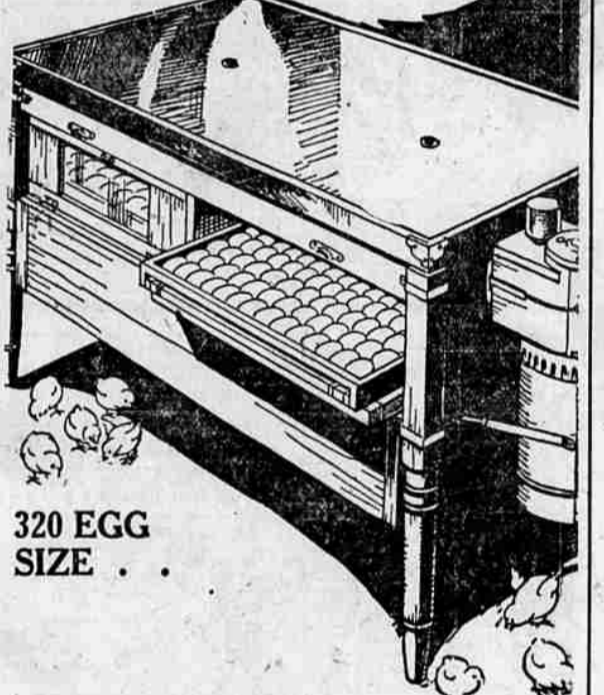
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
