

BEAVERS LEADING NORTHERN SECTOR BASKETBALL RACE

Two Straight Defeats for Huskies in Week-End Series Gives Half-Game Advantage—W. S. C. 2nd

SEATTLE, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The Oregon State Beavers were riding high today towards a northern division coast conference basketball title, with its series with the two toughest opponents over, four of its remaining six games with the "cellar team," and leading the league by half a game.

Thumping the University of Washington Huskies with two straight defeats here on Friday and Saturday nights, 23 to 29 and 22 to 26, the Beavers took the league lead, with seven wins and three defeats.

Meanwhile, the schedule favors Oregon State the rest of the season. Washington State, from which the Beavers took two of four games, and Washington, from which they won three out of four, still meet in four games, and they may "kill" each other's chances by splitting their four games, or even with one team winning three of them.

Oregon State, meanwhile, has four games with Oregon, which has failed to win a single one of its eight games this year, and two with Idaho, who are in fourth place in the standings: The standings:

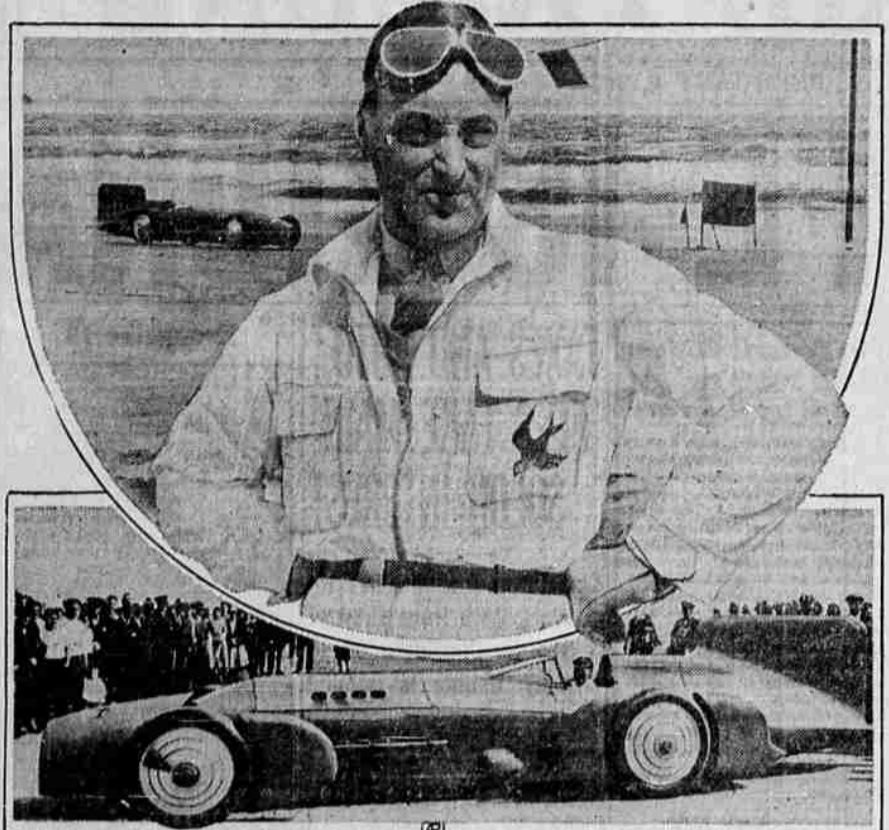
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LAUGHING at DEATH

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.—(AP)—

The lure of speed has called a doughty Britisher back for greater triumphs on the roaring road.
He is Sir Malcolm Campbell of England, whose name and fame fill a large niche in the history of automobile record achievements during the past decade.

Driving a long, trim 2500 horsepower car, the intrepid veteran comes here seeking to break his own land speed record of 253 miles an hour in what may be his valedictory to the racing world.

He is 48 years old now and, although still in his prime, he may decide after his forthcoming trials that his contribution to the advancement of speed entitles him to a well-deserved retirement from a thrilling career he has followed for nearly a quarter of a century.

With the record threatened to be pushed still higher by his own skillful driving, racing officials believe Campbell may figure the mark is beyond reach for a time at least and withdraw from the racing game to rest on his laurels.

Competition for the Britisher has been meager for the last four years and at present there is no known driver who has made a definite threat to oust him from his throne. Several have announced their hopes, but they have not yet progressed past the ballyhoo stage.

Same Old "Bluebird."

The car Sir Malcolm will drive in his forthcoming trials is the same "Bluebird" in which he set the present record a year ago, although it has been slightly re-designed to perfect streamlining and is equipped with a new 2500 horsepower motor.

During one of his two official runs here last year, he attained the amazing speed of 257 miles an hour. Now, with 1000 added horsepower in his car, he seeks to boost the record well beyond its present mark.

Modest and reticent, Campbell makes no predictions as to the speed he hopes to attain, but officials believe he will shoot for the 300 mile-an-hour mark.

Two years ago he admitted he wanted to be the first man to drive an automobile 300 miles an hour—five miles a minute. That was just after he became the first driver to hit a four mile-a-minute clip with a record of 345. He said then that if he could, some day do 800 he would be satisfied.

Luck Plays a Part.

"When you are going at near-record speed," Sir Malcolm has said, "it is largely a matter of luck whether you clip off that fraction of a second that means the difference between success and failure. All I can do is push down hard on the accelerator, steer a straight course and hope for the best."

The condition of the beach wind resistance, variable atmosphere that affects carburetion and suitable ideas are some of the problems with which the driver is faced, in addition to possible mechanical trouble.

So far, he has mastered them all.
