Wrecked By Seas

ST. GEORGES, N. F., Feb. 10.—(AP)—Swirling waters of Bay St. George, backed up today under the force of a gale out of the northwest, carried wreckage from a dozen coastal villages out to sea. The bay, swept by gales yesterday, flooded the village of Sandy Point and forced its 450 fisherfolk to seek refuge in their attics. Other villages reported losses of fishing stores, boats and gear, and the total damage will run into thousands of dollars.
