

Tourney Opens Local Golf Season Today

GREAT GALAXY OF DIVOT DIGGERS TO TRY BLIND BOGEY

Members of Rogue Valley Club and Non-Members to Join in Play for Hams — Lunch Served 2:30 P. M.

"Nothing but a snowstorm will stop the tournament now," was the statement given out by A. P. Johnson, chairman of the tournament committee of the Rogue Valley Golf club in speaking of the "blind bogey" tournament to open the golf season today. Members and non-members will take part in the tourney, and judging from the crowds attending the tournaments for turkeys held last fall, at least 100 players are expected.

Hams for winners. Earlier in the week, a general blizzard and storm over the United States made it look bad for the tournament, but as the Rogue River valley escaped the storm the tournament will go on as scheduled, Johnson said. Hams will be given for prizes instead of turkeys, and an average of one ham for every four players will be given out.

Members and non-members will select handicaps before starting, with the members playing for a net score of 70 and non-members for a net score of 75. Many tournaments have already been made up, as the tournament has been the chief topic of conversation among golfers of the valley for the past week.

Lunch at 2:30 P. M. Lunch will be served at 2:30 o'clock and the price of the lunch is included in the green fees. Johnson advised the golfers to tell their wives that "they won't be home until dark."

Musical encouragement to the players will be spread over the course by the public address system that played such an important part in the last big tournament held last fall. Johnson, although he wouldn't admit it, will in all probabilities, be at the "mike."

HIGHWAY ROUTE COST IRONED OUT

It is confidently expected by Ashland citizens that the state highway commission, at a hearing to be called soon, will take steps towards construction on the Ashland unit.

American Tobacco company fired the first shot by announcing it had cut its leading brand to \$5.50 a thousand from \$6—the second reduction this year by that manufacturer.
