print copy of the News, for back pay "third party ownership" is plead as a basis for the defense, with the claim the News was operated on an employees' co-operative basis. The agreement was signed by part of the employees, but not by L. A. Banks.

It is expected that Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene will be here this week to hear further moves in the recent petition of Former Sheriff Ralph G. Jennings against Circuit Judge L. O. Lewelling of Albany has signified that he will be here the end of February to hear the receivership suit of the News Publishing Co., L. R. Tuttle, president, against L. A. Banks, president, and the Medford News Publishing Co., for possession and collection of approximately \$11,000 allegedly due, on promissory notes.

Both juries were assigned to the two cases on affidavits of prejudice, and have been delayed by pressure of court business in their own districts.
