C. OF C. DIRECTORS VOICE CONFIDENCE IN COUNTY HEADS

The meeting of the board of directors of the chamber of commerce, held today noon at the Hotel Jackson considered a number of reports of the chamber's committees, and adopted a resolution, presented to the board after adoption by the Medford Realty Board, expressing confidence in Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, County Commissioners Billings and Nelson, District Attorney George Coddling, and County Clerk George Carter, and urging that the people of Jackson county support the administration of the present county officials.

Copies of the resolution, which are being prepared this afternoon, will be sent to the officials concerned, and express the hope that these officials be allowed to pursue the conduct of their regular business without hindrance or interference by any group desirous of obstructing the course of justice. The opinion of the chamber board, as expressed at today's meeting, is that the citizens and taxpayers of Jackson county must, if conditions here are expected to resume a normal course, recognize the authority of our courts and support the administration of local government.

Reports of the publicity, finance, agricultural and legislative committees of the chamber occupied the remainder of the board session.

HEAVY LOSS SEEN IF GIN MARRIAGE BILL IS ADOPTED

Southern Oregon counties—chiefly Jackson, Josephine and Klamath—will be hit in the pocketbook if the "gin-marriage law" is passed by the present legislature. The law requires that three days elapse between the issuance of the marriage license and the formal tying of the nuptial knot. The law was copied after the California law, and is something of a reciprocal move, beneficial to northern California counties.

It is estimated conservatively that the enforcement of the law will mean the loss of between \$75,000 and \$100,000 per year in revenue, from newlyweds to this county alone, with corresponding amounts in Klamath and Josephine counties. Jackson county has been a favorite arena for the northern California lovers, the past five years. The grooms bought rings, gasoline, meals, wedding garments of local merchants, not to mention the marriage fees, and the paying of the preacher. It's a big day in the life of the grooms, and they are not bothered by economy.

The Jackson county clerk's office last year issued 309 marriage licenses and it is figured that half of the applicants came from California points.

The Oregon law does not affect, in any large degree, Portland and the Willamette valley counties. The lovers there can drive to Vancouver, Wash., and plight their troth with the minimum of wait and delay. The Oregon law is heralded as putting a stop to ill-advised marriages, ill-advised or not, love will find a way. California couples will be able to find Vancouver also.

The California coast counties journeyed to Grants Pass for their licenses, the north California counties came to this city.
