

NORLING MINE TO START OPERATION WITH NEW MILL

The Norling mine, about nine miles from Medford, being a west extension of the Opp vein, is being equipped with a new mill and will soon be in operation on a production basis that will show a good profit to the owners.

The Norling mine was located about 1909 or 1910 by John Norling, who uncovered a rich chute of ore from which several carloads were shipped and about \$15,000 taken out. One carload alone netting the owners some \$6000.

The property then changed hands, passing to Frank Newman and associates, who did a lot of development work on the main veins, and the property was then transferred to Harold and Fred Colvig. The property was being held by location and assessment work and when mining became inactive, following this period, the claim was abandoned.

Two years ago it was located by Charles and John Schump and some work was done at that time and it was held by them until June of 1932, when it was taken over by the present owners, Don Marvin and Edward Law, who paid cash for the property.

Development work has been carried on since and enough ore of commercial grade developed to supply a 20-ton mill for two years. More than 2000 tons of that ore that will average \$15 per ton is now in sight and the partners have a hundred tons broken down that will show a recovery of better than \$25 per ton.

A ball mill, manufactured by Barnett & Hooper of Grants Pass, is now on the way to the property, which will be equipped with gravity concentration and flotation.

Mr. Law, who was in Medford recently, arranged through the Southern Oregon and Northern California Mining association, to have the road to the property opened up to permit the transfer of the mill to the property, assured the writer that the installation of this equipment would make the mine a profitable small producer and that, within a period of 30 days, it would be in operation, employing five or six men to start.

This is but one of a number of like activities in a mining way that is due to be placed on a productive basis with the assistance of a little co-operation for the industry.

A number of important matters, among which are proposed legislative enactments vitally affecting the mining industry of this section, are to be considered at a special meeting of the Southern Oregon and Northern California Mining association to be held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at Medford this evening at 7:30. A full attendance of the membership is desired.
