In 1910 the family moved to Phoenix and he purchased the Cory Nook orchard. He was a man of fine character and a friendly gentleman and will be mourned by a host of friends besides his family. LITTLE ROAD WORK POSSIBLE NOW FOR COUNTY'S JOBLESS

A concentrated effort to put to work the great ranks of the unemployed in Jackson county was announced yesterday morning by County Commissioners Ralph Billings and R. E. Nealon. All road supervisors in the county were instructed to make definite surveys in their districts to determine the amount of permanent work to be done and the number of persons in each district in need of employment some time ago.

The report of the supervisors, the commissioners stated, showed that little work could be accomplished at this time because of the condition of the soil as a result of snows and rains. Drainage and ditching, however, will employ a number of men until soil conditions enable more to go to work.

County machinery will be employed at once, they stated, employing others, in order that everything will be in readiness in case the funds anticipated from the Reconstruction Finance corporation are forthcoming.

The necessity for providing men with work, for the good of the unemployed and the county, was emphasized by the commissioners, who stated that they are doing everything in their power to put men to practical work, and that the work to be given the unemployed will be of a type beneficial to the county as well as to the needy.

In another damage action filed yesterday, C. E. Holleran, factory representative on the Pacific coast of the Trucking company of Milwaukee, Wis., seeks \$1500 general damages and \$300 special damages, from the Stage Terminal company, operators of the Jackson Hotel.

Holleran alleges that while a guest of the Hotel Jackson March 27, he slipped and fell on the bathroom floor of a room in the hotel, and sustained broken ribs. Holleran charges that the hotel failed to make proper safeguards for preventing water from gathering on the floor of the bathroom, and that when he stepped out of the bath, he slipped and fell, striking another bathroom fixture, and sustained the broken ribs.

Two other persons riding with Lindsay at the time were injured. It was reported.

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DAMAGES OF \$10,000 SOUGHT FOR DEATH OF LINDSAY IN CAR CRASH

In a suit for damages filed in circuit court yesterday by Louise Sargent against L. F. Belknap, \$10,000 sought for the death of Grandy D. Lindsay, 48, as the result of an auto accident last January on the Pacific highway near the fairgrounds Belknap is a well known orchardist. The suit is brought through Lonnie Sargent, an administrator of the estate.

The complaint alleges that the accident, which resulted in the death of Lindsay was due to the negligence and carelessness of Belknap, and it is charged that he drove in the face of traffic, in entering the lane, to his home.

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MORTGAGE GROUP WILL MEET IN CITY

Members of the farm mortgage adjustment committees, which have recently been appointed throughout the state, in each county, will meet in four districts on Tuesday, with one of the district conferences announced in Medford at the Elks temple at 2:30 p. m.

Representatives from Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Klamath and Lake counties are scheduled to meet here, and representatives of the state committee will also be present, according to announcement.

Jackson county's committee is composed of Henry Conger of Jacksonville, Ross Kline of Eagle Point, John Anderson of Central Point, J. A. Perry and R. O. Fowler of Medford. Raymond R. G. also of this city, is a member of the state committee and will be in attendance.

Hemmingsway, who spent the evening discussing the question of discontinuing the state hygienic health laboratory and also problems of the state industrial accident commission.
