PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 24.—(AP)—One of the chief factors against the market for eggs at the moment appears the distribution by interests who have no established place of business.

Prices were holding practically unchanged for the day. The movement into store was gaining rapidly.

Market for butter continues to reflect steadiness but without general price change either for cubes or prints.

Butterfat values were also holding up well. Make was holding with little change.

There was an acute shortage of live chickens in the local trade. Marketing by western Washington has subsided considerably since the previous low prices were named.

Locally there was no change in the price.
