

HOLMAN CHARGES ARE UNPROVED IS COMMITTEE VIEW

Ways and Means Sub-Committee Report Adopted in Board of Control Controversy—Pay Not Boosted

SALEM, Feb. 24.—(AP)—As forecast several days ago, the ways and means committee last night declined to uphold State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman in his charges against William E. King, secretary of the state board of control, and Henry M. Hansen, budget director.

Holman had charged the two officials with padding their budget estimates for the purpose of securing liberal appropriations from the legislature. The committee adopted the report of a sub-committee composed of Representatives Snider and Walker and Senator Woodward, who appended to the report the hope that dissemination in the board of control would be brought to an end.

"It is evident to your committee," says the report, "that our state treasurer submitted in behalf of his department a budget which represented in his honest judgment economies as low as could be made with due regard to efficiency. It is the opinion of the committee that the same may be said concerning the budget director and state purchasing agent.

"There is no proper ground for criticism as to certain items affecting employees temporarily hired. Your committee does not find that there was at any time by any of the various departments intentional increases in salaries or wages in respective departments with a view of circumventing or evading future salary reductions necessary for the ways and means committee to make."

CAREY APPOINTED MOTT SUCCESSOR

SALEM, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Judge Charles H. Carey of Portland will be the state corporation commissioner, announced Governor Julius L. Meier commission late yesterday, as had been earlier predicted by the Associated Press.

Carey will succeed James W. Mott, present commissioner, who retires March 4 to assume his duties as congressman from the first district. Governor Meier and Judge Carey were in conference here yesterday.

Weekly Bible Class Announces Outline

The weekly Bible study class met Tuesday evening in the Women's Civic club rooms. Approximately 45 were present, and the lesson presented by Mrs. E. N. Warner.

The class has completed the study of Genesis, which covers the first four dispensations. (A dispensation is a period of time during which God deals in a particular way with man in respect to sin, and to man's responsibility.)

Before taking up the study of Exodus, which begins the fifth dispensation, it was thought best to study the dispensations as a whole and the lesson last Tuesday was from a chart showing the beginning of each dispensation, particular events of each and the judgment passed upon each because of man's failure to keep his responsibility to God.

The chronological outline was as follows:

1. Dispensation of Innocence—from the creation of man—Genesis 1:2—when man was responsible to keep his innocence—to the expulsion from Eden—Genesis 3:24.
2. Dispensation of Conscience—from the birth of Cain (when man is responsible to do good and not evil) to the Flood—a period of 1655 years.
3. Dispensation of human government—from the ark to the confusion of tongues at Babel—a period of 427 years.
4. Dispensation of promise—from the call of Abram to the Egyptian bondage—a period of 430 years.
5. Dispensation of Law—from the giving of the law at Sinai to the crucifixion of Christ—a period of 1524 years.
6. Dispensation of Grace—from the resurrection of Christ to the Rapture of the Church—the term of this period is not known—Matthew 24:36.
7. Dispensation of the Kingdom—during which Christ and his church will reign over restored Israel and over the earth for one thousand years.
