

# ROOSEVELT AND FARLEY DISCUSS PATRONAGE DOLE

### Heavy Police Guard Maintained As President-Elect Leaves Albany After Attending Annual Dinner

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 24. — (AP) — President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt and the national Democratic chairman, James A. Farley, left here at 10:30 a. m. today, for the Roosevelt home at Hyde Park, where they will discuss federal patronage problems.

The President-elect had spent the night as the guest of his successor as the head of the state government, Governor Herbert H. Lehman, after having attended the annual dinner of the Albany legislative correspondents' association last night.

Heavy Police Guard. The Roosevelt party was escorted to the city line by Albany police on motorcycles and in "prowl cars." The entire route from the executive mansion to the new Hudson river bridge was lined with uniformed policemen. Secret service operatives, plain clothes city detectives and state troopers also were on duty to protect the next President.

The Roosevelt home at Hyde Park is about 70 miles from Albany. The President-elect and his staff completed his cabinet last night with the announcement that George H. Dern, former governor of Utah, would be his secretary of war.

Douglas Budget Director. He also gave a surprise with the statement that Rep. Lewis Douglas, youthful Arizona advocate of economy in government, would be his new budget director. Douglas led the economy drive in the house and will be relied upon by Roosevelt to use the axe on government expenditures in the sweeping reorganization act.

Mayor James M. Curley of Boston is one of the Roosevelt intimates on the list for appointment to high office.

Meanwhile the capital was scanning reports anxiously to determine whether a rumored revolutionary movement was taking form. Mexico City dispatches recently predicted that a movement of rebels from the mainland toward Cuba would coincide with bombings in Havana.

# Dogs and Horse to Go to Washington With Roosevelts

NEW YORK. — (AP) — "Weeie" and "Pat" are going to be replaced on the White House lawn March 4 by "Meggie" and "Major."  
And into the White House stable will move a bay mare named "Dot," "Weeie," a friendly and playful little Norwegian elkhound, and "Pat," a police dog, belong to President and Mrs. Hoover. They appeared with the present first lady of the land in a photograph on her Christmas cards a few weeks ago, and the greeting in her handwriting below the picture was from "Lou Henry Hoover, Weeie and Pat."  
"Meggie," a little black Scottish terrier with reproachful eyes, and "Major," a police dog, belong to President-elect and Mrs. Roosevelt. And "Dot" is Mrs. Roosevelt's saddle horse.



When President-elect and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt move to Washington, two pet dogs and a saddle horse are going along. "Meggie," a Scottish terrier, and "Major," a police dog, will replace the Hoover dogs as White House pets, while "Dot," Mrs. Roosevelt's saddle horse, will be given a stall in the White House stable. Mrs. Roosevelt intends to take a daily horseback ride.

"Meggie" dislikes baths. "Meggie" is eight years old and very fat and, when she is taken for a walk, she always barks until she reaches the end of the first block, after which her deportment is most dignified. She likes to sleep in fireplaces. Besides the resultant baths, she never makes a fuss over anyone except Mrs. Roosevelt.

Before he went away to school, "Meggie" used to belong to the Roosevelts' youngest son, John. After he left, she attached herself to Mrs. Roosevelt. Until recently she divided her time between Hyde Park and Albany, but she is living at present at 49 East 65th street, the Roosevelt town house.

Someone gave her a bright red collar for Christmas with a silver plate on it, bearing the inscription, "Meggie—the White House—Washington." She wasn't much interested in it, however.

"Major" Well Trained. "Major," a handsome buff and black German shepherd, trained for police work, was presented to President-elect Roosevelt several years ago by the troop of state police to which Sergeant Earl Miller, then his bodyguard, was attached. His present address is Krum Elbow, the Roosevelt estate at Hyde Park.

There are several other police dogs there, and it's "Major's" job to keep them in order. He himself has a trick which is frequently misunderstood. He walks up to each visitor, takes the visitor's wrist gently but firmly in his teeth, and scrutinizes him before he lets him in. It makes "Major" unpopular with some visitors, but he really doesn't mean any harm. It's part of his training as an alert dog.

"Dot" lives at Hyde Park now, too. She also formerly belonged to the state troopers, the Roosevelts having traded another saddle horse for her. Mrs. Roosevelt hopes to go horseback riding every morning in Rock Creek park.

## Menus of the Day

CORN BREAD, QUICKLY MADE  
A Menu for Dinner

Spanish Steak Potato Cakes  
Buttered Turnips  
Corn Bread  
Head Lettuce French Dressing  
Date Pie Whipped Cream

Coffee  
Spanish Steak  
2 pounds round steak  
4 tablespoons fat  
4 tablespoons chopped onions  
4 tablespoons chopped green peppers  
4 tablespoons chopped celery  
1 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons flour  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
2 cups tomatoes

Have steak cut about 2-3 inch thick. Pound well on both sides. Heat fat in frying pan. Add and quickly brown steak. Add onions, peppers and cel-

ery. Cook 3 minutes. Sprinkle with flour and mix well. Add rest of ingredients. Cover and cook very slowly for 1 1/2 hours. Turn meat several times during cooking to allow even browning.

Potato Cakes. (Uses leftover mashed potatoes.)  
2 cups mashed potatoes  
1 egg  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 tablespoon paprika  
4 tablespoons flour  
4 tablespoons fat

Mix potatoes, egg, salt and paprika; shape into six cakes and roll in flour; heat fat in frying pan; add cakes and cover; cook 3 minutes over moderate fire. Use spatula and carefully turn and brown other sides.  
Leftover mashed sweet potatoes may be prepared same way as white potatoes.

Corn Bread.  
2-3 cup cornmeal  
1 1-3 cups flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 egg  
1 cup milk  
3 tablespoons fat, melted  
Mix ingredients and beat 3 minutes; pour into shallow, greased pan; bake 20 minutes in moderately slow oven. Serve warm.

Crabmeat a la King  
Jellied Fruit Salad  
Bread and Butter Sandwiches  
Coffee  
Spice Nut Cookies  
Crabmeat a la King.  
6 pieces hot buttered toast  
6 tablespoons butter  
6 tablespoons flour  
3 cups milk  
1 1/2 cups crabmeat  
1/4 cup chopped cooked celery  
1/4 cup chopped pimientos  
2 eggs, beaten  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
Melt butter; add flour. When blended, add milk and cook slowly until creamy sauce forms; stir constantly; add crabmeat and seasonings and cook 2 minutes; add eggs and cook one minute, stirring constantly; pour over toast and serve at once.

1 cup chopped nuts  
4 1/2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons soda  
Cream the fat and sugar; add eggs and cream and beat 2 minutes; add rest of ingredients and mix well; press dough into greased loaf pan; chill 12 hours or longer; unmold, use very sharp knife and cut off thin slices; place 3 inches apart on greased baking sheets and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.

## Jellied Fruit salad.

1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture  
1 cup seeded white grapes  
1 cup diced pineapple  
1/2 cup seeded white cherries  
1/2 cup red cherries  
Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved; add lemon juice and sugar; cool and allow to thicken a little; add rest of ingredients; pour into glass mold and chill until stiff. Cut in squares and serve on lettuce. Top with salad dressing.

## Spice Nut Cookies.

(Icebox Kind.)  
1 cup fat  
2 cups brown sugar  
2 eggs  
2 tablespoons cream  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/4 teaspoon salt
