RUDDY LUECK OF MEDFORD THIRD IN SEVERE TEST

Trek From Fort Klamath to Rim and Return Negotiated in 4 Hours, 30 Minutes—Puckett Second

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 27.—(AP)—P. O. Herberg, Modoc Point distance skier, won the premier event of the seventh Crater Lake Ski club winter carnival at Fort Klamath Sunday by flashing over the finish line ahead of the field in the 32-mile race from Fort Klamath to Crater lake and return.

The winner followed O. K. Puckett, Reno, defending champion, through-out 31 miles of the grueling contest, but showed too much stamina for last year's titlist and went into the lead in the final mile. Hedberg took four hours and 30 minutes to cover the lengthy course. Puckett followed in second position and Ruddy Lueck of Medford was third.

Hedberg's time in the event was just 30 minutes faster than a run made by a dog team piloted by Scotty Allan, Alaska musher, over the same distance. Allan, however, was accompanied on the trip by Miss Doris Noah, Port Klamath, queen of the carnival.

Magnus Hanson, Klamath Falls ski jumper, outdistanced all competitors.

TRACK AND FIELD CLIMAX SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(AP)—The Intercollegiate, the track and field meet which usually manages to pack as many thrills into 12 events as the other meets of the indoor season proper, in all their long programs combined, brings its 13th winter campaign up to its grand climax next Saturday.

The original entry sheet for the twelfth annual indoor meet of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America listed 523 runners, jumpers and weight men from 27 colleges. Of these, some 300—the pick of the lot—will compete.

Joe McCluskey of Fordham, winner of the two-mile race in record time for the past two years, is figured as the leader in the assault on the records.

The Fordham ace has been almost unbeatable indoors this season, retaining his title in the 3,000-meter steeplechase at the national indoor championships last Saturday and shattering the unofficial world mark for the event.

SEATTLE, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Denied for seven years since their last title in 1925, Coach State Gill and his Oregon State five need to win only one of their two games with Oregon Friday and Saturday to grasp the northern division coast conference basketball championship.

With the defending titlist, the University of Washington Huskies, finishing their season with 10 victories and 6 defeats, capping it with a 34 to 28 over Oregon here Saturday night, Oregon State has a standing of 10 victories and 4 losses.

Meanwhile, the surprising University of Idaho Vandals won their second straight game from Washington State on Saturday night at Pullman, 40 to 38, and climbed even with the Cougars in the standings. Another two-game series will finish their season this week.
