Out of the banking industry in Michigan there had come today the nucleus of two new Detroit banks, backed by the millions of Henry Ford. In Ohio 18 banks in three cities—Cleveland, Akron and Dayton—clamped down on withdrawals in anticipation of emergency banking laws to relieve a situation aggravated, according to Ohio bankers, by the emergency in Michigan.

Governor Ritchie of Maryland, where a bank holiday has been declared pending action by the legislature to protect the interests of banks and public, sought today the advice of "representative citizens" concerning legislation to be enacted.

Indianapolis banks opened today with withdrawals restricted to five per cent of the customer's deposit.

Dr. L. D. Inakeep, city health officer, stated today that the city of Medford will announce the grades of milk for this city on the first of April. He said that 100 tests of milk and cream had been made during March.

Producers furnishing milk to the city of Medford, will be given notice the first of April if their product does not reach the grade A standard, Dr. Inakeep said, and quarterly reports will be given throughout the year, hereafter.

Police guards were placed at the Community relief feeding places in Portland today to prevent possible trouble by "striking" unemployed single men who were to be refused free meals unless they worked in the community woodyard.

All but a few of the 350 to 500 men who ordinarily earn two meals a day and lodging by working two hours at the Portland common woodyard have been "on strike" for several days. They demand 60 cents an hour, with a minimum week of 12 hours, better food and improved sleeping quarters.

All were served breakfast this morning, but the relief associations issued an order that no other meals were to be given those who refused to work.

CO-OPERATION, NOT PARTISANSHIP BIG REQUIREMENT NOW

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. — (AP) — President Hoover, in a letter designed to outline the future stand of the Republican party, today suggested to the executive committee of the Republican national committee that "in these times cooperation and not partisanship is the need of the country."

Mr. Hoover outlined what he called a party platform upon which all Americans can stand without partisanship, including insistence upon sound currency, restraint upon federal spending and insistence upon government integrity as to its obligations.

The President's letter was read behind closed doors to members of the executive committee by Chairman Everett Sanders, and a reply was drafted immediately and dispatched to the White House, signed by 15 of the committeemen.

Their letter expressed "the deep appreciation of the loyal members of our party to your unceasing and effective labors in behalf of the American people."

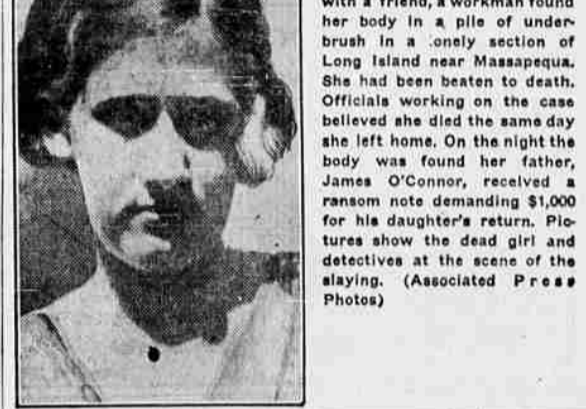

FEHL ARRESTED FOR CONNECTION BALLOT TAKING

Two of the ballot containers stolen from the courthouse, were found Sunday in Rogue River, and the stream was being dragged today for more, at various points. The authorities state that some of the ballots were burned in the courthouse, and some carried away in autos and dumped into Rogue river. People living in the vicinity of the courthouse took notes of the feverish activity in the rear of the courthouse. Numbers of the autos in which large objects were placed and driven away, were noted by citizens, when they suspected "something was going on."

Flotters Long Watched It also developed today, that the first arrest in the ballot stealing case was made less than two hours after its discovery, and that the local situation has been under the eyes of outside investigators for the past six weeks. The authorities were reticent on this angle, and refused to amplify the report.

The climax of the ballot robbery caused a tremendous sensation throughout the length and breadth of Jackson county. The citizenry as a whole demanded that no steps or expense be spared to solve the crime. The most common comment was: "There's no excuse for that kind of stuff." The citizenship in all walks is demanding that the crime be probed to the bottom, and quickly.
