

Double-Main-Event Wrestling Card Slated Armory Mat Tonight

THROWING OF Foe FROM RING WILL BE FROWNED UPON

Promoter Says Unorthodox Grappling Hurts Sale of Ringside Seats — Rough And Ready Men To Meet.

The gentle pastime of hurling an opponent into the laps of ringside customers will be frowned upon at tonight's "grip and groin" carnival, according to promoter Mack Lillard, who has asked for the presence of a pair of husky policemen at the ringside to curb the playful tactics of the matmen. The reason for Lillard's action is the disclamation of cash customers to occupy ringside chairs when they are liable at any moment to receive a 200-pound grappler in the midriff.

On tonight's double main event card, Ray Friable, home-grown gladiator, will mix grips with Glen Stone, Puget Sound sensation, who has gained a reputation for a rough and ready style of workmanship on the mat. The men are heavyweights and will wrestle one hour or until a deciding fall has been gained.

On the opening half of the card, Thor Jensen, erratic athlete of the Northlands, meets Rex Mobley, southern product, in an hour's test, or two falls out of three.

Jensen has kept Portland fans in a furor all winter by his unorthodox style, and has caused two near-riots at matches in the Rose City by alleged unsportsmanlike conduct. Mobley himself is a pink-tea proposition in the ring, and if Jensen wishes to dilute his wrestling with a little rough stuff, the southerner will be glad to accommodate him.

Tonight's card, which will start promptly at 8:30 at the Armory, marks the return of wrestling to Medford after an absence of several months. New low prices will prevail for the show and Les Weiss will be third man in the ring in both events.

SOLONS ENTERING STRONGER SQUAD IN COAST LEAGUE

Many Old Familiar Faces Retained With Smattering Of New Talent—Help In Hurling Seen Main Need.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Sacramento's Senators a team that almost annually crosses up the baseball observers by finishing higher in the pennant race than was predicted, will open the 1933 season with most of the old faces on deck but enough newcomers in the lineup to keep outsiders guessing from the start.

The squad that owner Lou Moering put on the field for the 1932 scramble was laughingly referred to in some quarters as a "cliché cellar champion." It finished the season in third place, nine and one-half games behind the flag-winning Portland team.

McNeely is Manager. A new deal toward the close of last season put Earl McNeely in the saddle as manager, succeeding Buddy Ryan. McNeely, former big leaguer with plenty of experience, touched off the necessary spark and the Senators came down the stretch in a driving finish.

Starting his first season as head man, McNeely will be without the services of Jimmy DeShong, sold to the Yankees. DeShong ended up with the best pitching record in the circuit, winning 20 and losing five games for an average of .870. He tied for sixth among the regulars in the matter of earned runs.

As it is, the Senators can use help in the hurling department. Ed Bryson, Larry Gillick and Andy House, all right-handers, and Tom Glynn and Louis Vincel, southpaws, will handle the burden of mound work. House formerly with Seattle and Oakland, was picked up as a free agent.

Woodall to Catch. Larry Woodall, formerly manager of the Portland club, will do the chief honors behind the plate. Kettle Wirtz, first-class assistant, will take his turn as usual.

The Sacs will operate with a couple of new hands in the infield this year and on paper the combination shapes up stronger than before. Alex Kampaouris, young Greek prospect, sailed through his first year last season and made a fine impression at second base. He appears to have the makings of a major league star.

Ray French, best shortstop in the league last year, will have opposition from Ray Gardner, former Cleveland player, who will report after being out of organized baseball for two years. It is likely French will be sold before the season opens.

Camilli on Duty. Dorr Camilli, one of the smoothest fielding first basemen in the loop, will be at his post. Only his lack of plate punch has kept him out of the majors. Lenny Backer, third sacker, is expected to come through this season stronger than last year.

In the outer garden, the club will be represented by Henry Steinbacher, left field; Stanley Bordagary, center field; and Cal Lehman, right field. Tony Boroja, formerly with Hollywood, was signed on as a free agent and will be available for utility purposes.

Manager McNeely calls attention to the fact he is still capable of chasing balls in the garden and can fill in at third base if the occasion arises.
