Medford Youth Making Good as A Comic Artist

An interesting story of a Medford youth, who has made good with his art, and who has, in making good, made the world a happier one for many folks to live in, is found in a newspaper announcement of Clifford McBride's latest book from the Castle press. Of it, Don Herold, artist-humorist, has said much, to make local people who remember "Clifford," glad to claim him as a former son of Medford.

McBride, now famous for the "Napoleon and Uncle Elby," his pen conceived, lived here when he was very young. He attended the old Washington school and received his first training in art under Miss Jane Smedley. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. McBride, who owned property on Rogue river. His progress with pen and ink has been watched by several local friends who treasure the latest edition of "Uncle Elby."

"In an America in which slapstick reigns supreme and in a country whose comic art is largely in the hands of butcher boys (not that I have anything against butchers or boys) Clifford McBride produces an output of humorous pen and ink pantomimes in which there is consistently gentlemanly restraint, gentlemanly drawing and gentlemanly intelligence," says Herold of McBride, adding that his drawings are "unspeakably un-American."

Then comes the reason for the title of Herold's introduction to the book, "An apology for Clifford McBride." . . . "I must apologize again and again for Clifford McBride, who has surreptitiously attained success," says he, "with a type of humorous art which is against all our traditions. It's too good for us—and yet it thrives. Maybe it will eventually help us to get a taste for something good in spite of ourselves."
