The house proceeded to the consideration of senate bills and several were passed before adjourning for the night.

SALEM, Mar. 1.—(AP)—The house of representatives today took first action on the much-debated and amended utilities control bill when it came before that body upon divided report. The measure, known as the Thomas bill, will go on the calendar following defeat of the minority report which would replace the senate-amended bill with the original measure.

### STREET WORK IS BOON TO JOBLESS

Giving work to an average of 82 former members of the unemployed daily, street improvement in the city of Medford started last Saturday, was progressing today with a number of crews stationed in various parts of the city. There are fifty men working on the streets today and 12 operating light trucks in removing dirt. One foreman and two sub-foremen are directing activities under the general direction of City Superintendent Fred Scherfel.

One crew was working today on the street east of the Jackson bridge, another on the storm culvert on Oak street, and still another on the improvement of Summit street between Fourth and Palm.

Surfacing material is being removed from the vicinity of the reservoir to be spread on Willamette.

Each crew is being worked for three successive days to be relieved at the end of that period by another crew drawn from the ranks of the unemployed. The men are assigned through Hamilton Patton, chairman of relief work in Jackson county.

### SEEK RETURN OF CONGRESS CARDS

Two residents of the county who had joined the "Good Government Congress" at its first meeting "before L. A. Banks had anything to do with it," yesterday afternoon called at the city police station to see if steps could be taken whereby they might withdraw from the organization.

The men told the officers that they had become members of the organization under the impression that they were to receive work. They said the membership cards did not in any way disclose the true purpose of the congress, and that they had not attended any of the meetings since Mr. Banks had become active in the organization.

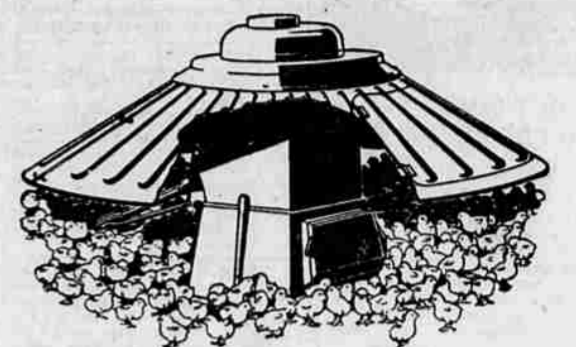

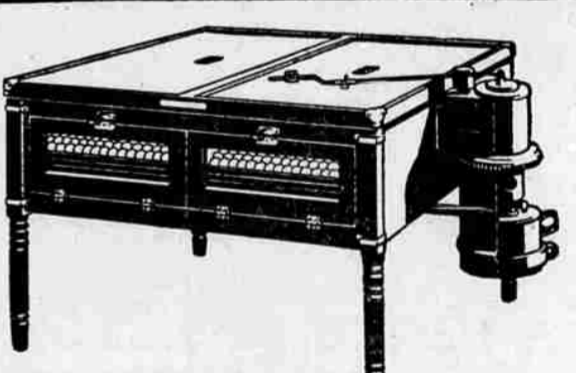
