Medford Garden Club Announces Early Plant Sale

A plant sale at an early date to be announced soon will be held under the auspices of the Medford Garden club with Mrs. L. Bundy who conducted last year's very successful sale again in charge.

At the meeting of the club last evening, Mrs. Bundy asked that plants be carefully heeled in or set aside so that they may be brought to the sale in best condition.

Members are asked to telephone Mrs. Bundy if they have plants to contribute.

Mrs. T. W. Miles, vice-president, presided at the meeting in the absence of the president, Mrs. A. E. Reames.

The transplanting of some of the many trees owned by the club and now in the care of Professor F. C. Reimer, to various park or other public sites, is being contemplated.

Investigation of the location of a sign board as to whether or not it is on city property is being made by the civic improvement committee, according to announcement of the chairman, Mrs. Leland Metzner, who stated that her committee wished to cooperate in any or all civic beautification plans.

Mrs. E. E. Wilson, chairman of the Junior Garden and 4-H committees, reported that plans are under way for beginning the work in the local schools.

Announcement of a series of garden lectures on each Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock over KOAC was made, with the next lecture to be given by Professor A. L. Peck on Mar. 9, his subject to be "General Garden Hints."

Mrs. Ethel Willis, the speaker of the evening, discussed "Oregon Native Shrubs" and illustrated her talk with pressed specimens, recommending most of them for transplanting for home use.

Among shrubs discussed were the hazel nut, silk tassel tree, the ooberry, choke cherry, white-flowered thimble berry, nine-bark, smallwood rose, wild rose, California, and meadow sweet.

Among other shrubs included were ocean foam, wild gooseberry, mountain ash, June berry, syringa, wild lilac, snow bush, cascara sagrada, or chittum vine maple, Oregon boxwood, red cedar, dogwood, elderberry, snowberry, manzanita, western azalea, pink rhododendron, autelope bush, mountain mahogany, red currant and Oregon grape.

The elderberry and Oregon grape are especially desirable as bird attracting shrubs according to the speaker, who discouraged the planting of the red currant because of its tendency to be a germ carrier of the white pine blister rust.

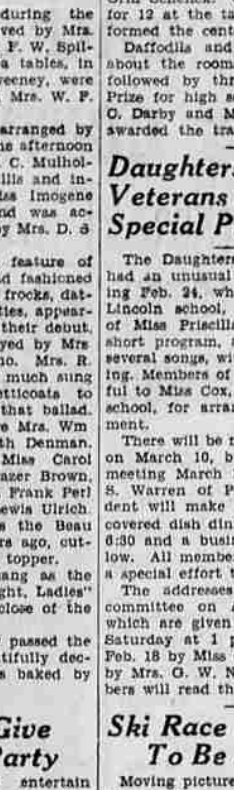
