Clubbed With Pistol. Manning wedded his empty gun, beating the deputy over the head with the butt in a bitter hand-to-hand struggle. By this time Sheriff Calkins arrived on the scene, and Manning was subdued and rushed to the county jail to evade the fast gathering crowd of angry citizens.

BUSY COURT DAYS START MONDAY IF MORATORIUM ENDS

The courts of Jackson county and legal procedure—marking time since the inauguration of the bank holidays, and the consequent non-judicial days—are expected to be resumed tomorrow, when banking is expected to again resume normally.

The grand jury, sworn in February 27 at the opening of the February term of court, is scheduled to start its first regular session tomorrow morning. One of the matters to be brought to its early attention will be evidence in the ballot stealing and burning outrage on the night of February 20. The district attorney's office Saturday was making its final round-up of the evidence. Subpoenas have been issued for a number of witnesses, including citizens who spent the evening on the south side of the court house, listening to a "Good Government" congress convocation and observing "going's on."

Banks Seek Donations. Other scheduled legal actions of the coming week, in which the general public is interested are: The sheriff's sale, Wednesday, March 15th, at 10 a. m., of the Medford Daily News, for approximately \$11,000, awarded on a judgment and decree against L. A. Banks, former editor and owner. An appeal has been made to "Good Government" members to make contributions. "Go" re-established, the free press in Jackson county.

Banks was dispossessed two weeks ago. A last hour attempt to regain control of the newspaper plant on a court process, is forecast, along with the report that an "Iowa show" would be staged to protest the foreclosure.

A ruling in the case of L. O. Van Wagon, charged with possession of a concealed weapon, is scheduled by Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman. Van Wagon was a "Banks guard" and "congressman."

Congress Head to Appear. Preliminary hearing of Henrietta B. Martin, president of the "Good Government congress," her father, C. H. Brown of the group; L. O. Van Wagon, and E. I. Pritch, charged with "disturbing the peace and riotous conduct," is also scheduled for the coming week. The warrants grew out of the attempt of Mrs. Martin to lash Leonard Hall, editor of the Jacksonville Miner, with a buggy whip for a published item to which Mrs. Martin took exception.

C. H. Brown, local resident for about a year, and busy courthouse figure since the first of the year, charged with "slandering a bank" is also expected to be arraigned the coming week. The charge grew out of an article published in the Pacific Record Herald, signed by Brown, in which he alleged money was being removed from a local bank, contrary to the bank moratorium rules. The charge met emphatic denials.

The petit jury has been called for service Monday morning, with Judge W. M. Duncan of Klamath county on the bench. A number of civil cases pend.

During the bank holiday, no legal documents have been filed with the county clerk, though a number are held for filing.

More votes were cast for all the candidates for county judge and sheriff, than were cast for presidential candidates. The count shows 638 more people voted for all the county judge aspirants than voted for presidential candidates; and 396 more were interested in the sheriff, than the head of the nation. The authorities hold that this is a wide and exceptional variance in public interest and voting.

In the total vote cast for all candidates for other leading state and county offices, the discrepancy in the totals is not pronounced, and all are fairly even. All county and state offices, with the exception of the county judge, sheriff, and district attorney ranged around the 19,000 mark, and the variance was from one to 233 votes, and averages around 100 votes difference.

District Attorney George A. Coddling said last week that a petition for a re-count and recount of the ballots not stolen by the ballot thieves would be asked. These include rural districts, Ballots from 46 precincts of the county were stolen. These include many where an exceptionally large vote was cast.

The total vote cast for all candidates for county judge—a holly counted race was 18,767. This is considerably more than were cast for any other national, state, or county office. The total vote cast for all candidates for sheriff was, 13,492 votes; and for district attorney, 13,058. These were the mainly contested races.

The total vote cast in the county for all the candidates for president was 13,139; for congressman, 12,194; for state treasurer, 12,952; for county commissioner, 13,121; for county clerk, 13,102; for assessor 12,952; for treasurer, 12,883; for school superintendent, 12,924.
