POPE PAINTS DARK PICTURE OF WORLD BEFORE CARDINALS

Christian Civilization Threatened by War On Human Society, Religion and God Himself — Will Pray

VATICAN CITY, Mar. 14.—(AP)—Christian civilization is threatened by "a war on human society, or religion and on God himself," the Pope told the cardinals' consistory yesterday. Painting a dark picture of the "critical international situation," the pope said disaster—moral, intellectual and spiritual—was being prepared inevitably for nations wherever the church is combated.

The pontiff promised that he would daily pray that God confer "concord upon the conference and conversations that will take place precisely during this holy year for world reconciliation, by conflicting interests and by inadequate and frequently contradictory measures that are proposed and attempted and by exaggerated and unjust nationalism, that which there is nothing more contrary to the brotherhood of man and peoples."

At the same time, he said, "again one hears the clash of fraternal arms and from the stained and devastated earth there rises to heaven the voice of a brother's blood."

The Pope then asked, "Is not this a call for all to reflect and consider whether and to what extent the present war on God is responsible for worldwide catastrophes of war and economic crisis?"

One Class Prospers. The Pope outlined to the 23 intently listening cardinals the difficulties of the economic crisis in which the weakest suffer the most, and then asked "there, however, are those who derive advantage and gain a hard advantage from the general hardship and misery."

The pontiff, who was dressed in a rich white cassock, a red mantle fringed with ermine, and a skull cap, raised his right hand in an emphatic gesture as he said he envied all countries and all nations with so many deplorable instances before them to consider what serious moral, intellectual and even material disaster is inevitably being prepared wherever the church is openly or covertly combated, hampered or opposed in its mission, sanctification and formation, especially among young people.

GRAND JURY EYES BALLOT STEALING IN FIRST SESSION

Witnesses Subpoenaed and Evidence Ready for Presentation—More Arrests Coming — Bonds Scarce

The grand jury impeached February 27, Theodore J. Bell, Jr. foreman convened this afternoon for its first session and was scheduled to start hearing testimony in two or three local matters of high public interest, including the brazen official ballot stealing and burning on Monday January 20, the night of the last "Good Government congress" convention in the courthouse auditorium. Witnesses have been subpoenaed and evidence ready for presentation to the grand jury.

Lengthy instructions were given to the grand jury at the time of the subpoenaing by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, in which he stressed their duty and the fact that they were an investigating body and not a trial jury. The grand jurors were also questioned relative to their qualifications.

More Arrests Coming. New arrests to the ballot theft case were scheduled for today. Authorities reported that five or six "John Does" had been absent from their regular haunts for two weeks or ten days.

Efforts were continued Sunday and Monday to secure \$5000 bonds for Thomas L. Brecheen, Ashland political worker, held with C. W. (Chuck) Davis in the Josephine county jail at Grants Pass, in connection with the amazing flouting of constituted authority, which ended the sheriff's court contest. A leader of the "Good Government congress" Sunday endorsed a Jacksonville district court order and "congressman" to sign Brecheen's bond, it was reported. A half dozen phone calls brought emphatic refusals, but the leader refused to take "no" for an answer. The leader made a personal call and request, and a stormy scene followed, it is reported. Brecheen was the "cheer speaker" at several "congressional sessions," it is reported. He declared he was a "personal friend" of President Roosevelt and Justice Brandeis of the U. S. supreme court. Connors still "in"

C. J. (Jean) Connors, described by the authorities as "the bright boy of the congress," and the official parliamentary, arrested Sunday in the Gold Hill district in the ballot theft case, was still in the city jail, in default of \$5000 bonds. Connors was found in a mine shaft, with a plentiful supply of food. He started mining soon after the ballot arrests started. Connors boasted he was a "college man" with a law degree. Reports from O. L. Goss, secretary of the Unemployed council, and other sources today, indicated that withdrawals from the "congress" were in full swing, with many demands for membership cards, in writing. The main reason was the general knowledge that the organization, despite lofty declarations, was becoming a "political club for personal gain for politicians and publicity seekers," he said. DORMANT SPRAYS FOR SCALE, MITES IS AGENT'S ADVICE

The application of dormant sprays for the control of San Jose scale, blister mite and rust mite should be given consideration by pear and apple growers at this time, states L. G. Genter of the Southern Oregon Experiment station and L. P. Wilcox, county agent.

Better control of blister mite and rust mite plus the advantage of preparing trees for later sulfur sprays in case of scale infections causes authorities to recommend the use of liquid lime sulfur on pears in preference to other materials. Liquid lime sulfur testing 32 degrees Baume gives best results when used at the rate of 10 to 12 gallons per 100 gallons of water. In order to control blister mite, applications should be made before the cluster pushes out from the bud scales. With this in mind, growers having blister mite infested orchards should not delay their spraying too long.

Dormant oil emulsions are as effective as lime sulfur in the control of San Jose scale if used at the proper strength. It is recommended that emulsion be diluted to the point where the resulting solution contains at least 4 per cent actual oil. This means that from four to five gallons of the emulsion be diluted in 100 gallons of water. Dormant oil sprays should not be used on the Winter Nellis variety of pears, as this variety shows a tendency to be susceptible to oil injury and bud and spur damage is likely to occur.

Apple growers may obtain a reasonable control of rosy apple aphid by delaying their application of dormant oil until buds have opened and leaves are from one-fourth to one-half inch in length. Such a program has been followed by growers in former season with good results. Thoroughness of spraying cannot be over-emphasized, care should be exercised in seeing that all parts of the tree receive a good drenching.
