### MRS. MARTIN TO BE TRIED LATER

Trial of Mrs. Henrietta B. Martin, president of the "Good Government Congress," for alleged disorderly and riotous conduct, as the result of her attempt to lash with a whip Leonard Hall, editor of the Jacksonville Miner, will not be held until the district attorney's office has a respite from the present labors connected with the grand jury session. Attorney T. J. Knight, representing Mrs. Martin and three co-defendants, said he was "ready for trial any time." The trial was interrupted by the bank moratorium, after being set for Justice of the Peace Coleman's court.

C. H. Brown, father of Mrs. Martin and secretary of the "Good Government Congress," arrested and free on bonds for alleged "slandering of a bank" as the result of an article published in the Pacific Record-Herald, will probably not be given a hearing for a week or ten days.

Justice Coleman will not render a decision in the case of L. O. VanWagon, charged with carrying concealed weapons, until his attorney has an opportunity to file briefs. VanWagon is a reputed "congressman" and former "banks guard."

certificate was issued against the newspaper. It was taken up by J. T. Thomas of Ashland and others, in the sum of \$1084. Mrs. Electa A. Pehl in a suit filed in circuit court claimed ownership of this certificate. Tuesday a restraining order was issued in

circuit court prohibiting any legal action to thwart the sale today. Plans of the purchasers of the property, for the future have not been announced.
