

### MRS. MARTIN GOES TO BASTILE ALONG WITH FOLLOWERS

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ed as her chauffeur and who held Editor Leonard Hall when she wielded a buggy whip upon him two weeks ago; the "Rev." Edwin Malmgren and her father, C. H. Brown, secretary of the organization.

In her statement today Mrs. Martin declared that the "Good Government Congress" retained 8000 members in contradiction, there is positive proof of wholesale withdrawals. Evidence indicates that the bona fide membership at no time exceeded 800. The withdrawals started with the ballot theft, and were speeded by Banks' revolutionary talk on the courthouse steps. The wanton slaying of Constable Prescott, yesterday caused a widespread revulsion of feeling against the "congress," its leaders and all its works.

Papers found in possession of C. H. Brown show that the collection of "funos" was fairly profitable. One day's proceeds were \$39.50. The list of contributors is being checked. Several are known to have been regular customers at the county commissary.

Mrs. Martin has been a firebrand figure in the recent agitation of the "Good Government Congress" leaders. She presided at all meetings. She attempted to buggy-whip Editor Hall of the Jacksonville Miner, proposed a boycott of all local merchants and was a commanding figure in the many conferences at Banks' home. She was a frequent uninvited witness before the grand jury of which William T. Grieve was foreman. Her last public appearance, on March 8, on the courthouse steps, she condoned the ballot theft with the claim "they should have been destroyed long ago," and intimated that the brazen and bungled crime was committed to "cover up liquor disappearances."

State police today were searching for "congressmen" on warrants charging criminal syndicalism. A sheet of warrants have been made out for service. For the most part, they are said to be for "courthouse guards" and agitators. Many made the courthouse their daily rendezvous, and were "cheer leaders" at all demonstrations.

None were around the courthouse this morning. Authorities report a general "hiding out."

### MRS. LA DIEU IS HELD AS WITNESS IN BANKS PLANS

State police announced today that they were holding Mrs. Arthur La-Dieu as a material witness in the slaying of Constable George Prescott by L. A. Banks, yesterday. The authorities also said "that several new angles are developing in the case, which are being scrutinized closely for leads."

The authorities refused to divulge the nature of the "angles," or to deny or confirm a query that a "conference" was held at the Banks home a night or so before the murder.

The Banks home is known to have been under surveillance since the threat of a "revolution," and the names of those who attended "the vital conferences" known.

Mrs. La Dieu was arrested yesterday when she appeared at the city police station, and asked to see her husband, held on a ballot theft indictment. She expressed satisfaction. It is alleged, at the murder of Constable Prescott and to have told Officer Cave "you will get yours."

### INDICTMENTS FOR BANKS, WIFE AND FLEMING COMING

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accompanied Constable Prescott, denies that any letters were handed to the slain officer, as Mrs. Banks charges.

The state will also show that Banks was warned in a telephone message that he had been indicted, and that a warrant would be served. The authorities last evening questioned James Guiche, his secretary, regarding what she knew concerning the tragedy and events leading to it.

Banks and his wife, in interviews yesterday, both attempted to justify their actions, and Banks condoned the murder by setting forth the plea he was "acting in defense of his home."

Mrs. La Dieu Tearful  
In the ordinary course of court procedure, Banks and co-defendants would be brought to trial within two weeks, but it is expected that every possible legal delay will be invoked by the slayer.

The grand jury will also consider the case of Mrs. Arthur La Dieu, arrested yesterday in the police station when she rushed to tell her husband, held as a ballot burner, that Prescott had been killed. She is alleged to have expressed satisfaction at the murder and to have told Officer Cave "And you will get yours." Mrs. La Dieu wept at her imprisonment. An effort will be made to indict her on a felony charge.

### WORTMAN NAMED BANKS RECEIVER

In circuit court this morning F. J. Wortman of Phoenix was named receiver for the Suncrest Orchards, Inc. of which L. A. Banks, slayer of Constable Prescott, and his wife, are the owners. Wortman was empowered to take charge at once.

The receiver was named upon the application of O. B. Waddell, assignee for the Medford National bank, recently given a \$9000 judgment against Banks, for money due on mortgages signed by the accused murderer in 1930 and 1931.

At the same time a judgment on a mortgage on the Banks home on West Main street, where the killing occurred, was ordered, and is approaching foreclosure.

Immediately following the slaying, the coroner placed a guard over the Banks home, and no one was allowed to enter. Several applications were rejected yesterday.

The custodian will remain in charge until all details of the murder and other angles have been cleared away.
