larger attorney to defend herself and husband. It is the intention of the district attorney's office to bring the three to trial as soon as possible. Making allowance for the usual legal procedure and delays, this would be from three weeks to a month. No inkling has been made public of the defense plans.

State police yesterday admitted that in their search of the Banks home they had found "plenty of evidence," and that they had taken fingerprints from many articles in the Banks home. Several sets of fingerprints were sent to the National Bureau of Identification at Washington, D. C., for confirmation, and the past records, if any.

Since last fall a legend has been prevalent among adherents of Banks, that he wore money belts containing large sums of money. He had "a couple of dollars" in his possession when searched. At one of his civil suit hearings, Banks flashed a small roll of bills, paid his chest significantly, and said: "There's more where these came from." His boasted wealth has not materialized. Banks was fingerprinted and photographed yesterday, in the Josephine county jail.

Visiting hours were established yesterday at the county jail, and all visitors must have a written order from the circuit court. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays were named as visiting days, from 9:30 to 11:30 in the morning, and from 1:30 to 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Three jailers are on duty.

Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific company, announced last evening that the Shasta will be discontinued March 27 between Grants Pass and Eugene. Such a step is being taken due to the decreased travel, evident for the past six months, Mr. Rosenbaum stated.

The cafe-lounge car is being removed, and No. 8 will stop here 20 minutes for breakfast, according to the announcement. Those boarding the south bound train in the evening should have dinner before leaving. A diner will be attached for breakfast before reaching San Francisco the next morning. A similar announcement of discontinuing the train was made last week, but action was postponed when messages from the leading civic groups of southern Oregon were forwarded to the company.
