Circulation of petitions to the governor asking that Schermerhorn be retained continues. The number of signatures secured was not made public, but it was reported that few were signing in this city and Ashland, and that in many instances the circulators met with rebuffs.

No further arrests are expected in the ballot burning case. All but two of the indicted 23 men are in custody, or under close surveillance. One is a "John Doe."

State police continued today to take the depositions of witnesses in both the Banks killing and in the criminal syndicalism and ballot thefts. County Judge Phil, Sheriff Schermerhorn and Virgil Edington are the only ones indicted at Liberty on bonds.

Jailers reported this morning that Mrs. Henrietta B. Martin, president of the "Good Government Congress" was in a cheerful mood, and accepting her confinement philosophically.

Mrs. Edith E. Banks, held on a first degree murder information, was said to be irritable and nervous, and not as haughtily defiant as first following her arrest.

railroad line, and that, therefore, in view of this public act the railroad company is required to maintain service adequate to fulfill the purpose for which the grant was made.

The complaint further charges that the railroad company gave assurance to the United States government, when the site for the northwest national soldiers' home was being considered, that it would always maintain train service at Roseburg equal to what was then maintained, and that cancellation of trains 7 and 8 therefore, cannot be ordered without violation of the promise given the federal government.

Various other causes for complaint are cited in the petition, which requests the public service commission to command the Southern Pacific company to rescind its order to and to continue to operate the same set-

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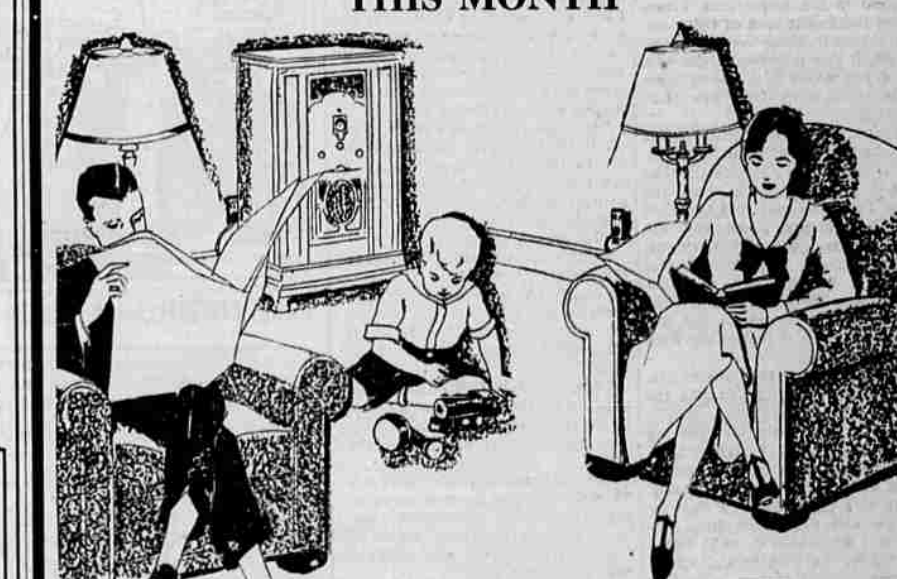
