

DRYS PLAN FIGHT TO RESTRAIN SALE OF BEER APRIL 7

Government Wheels in Motion to Open Taps After Midnight — Beer Prisoners' Status Requested

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The federal government today moved swiftly to open the beer taps through which a legal 3.2 brew will flow to America's thirsty after midnight April 6.

Machinery to license brewers was set in motion by Dr. James M. Doran, industrial alcohol commissioner, who pledged himself to keep bootleg racketeers out of the legalized industry.

Government officials acted quickly after President Roosevelt signed the law which permits the sale of beer and wine of 3.2 percent alcoholic content.

The President's action signalled the end of the absolute prohibition which has prevailed since 1920.

Leaders of prohibition organizations meantime, made plans for testing the law's constitutionality and for blocking the sale of beer by injunction.

Government officials estimate that an annual revenue of \$125,000,000 to \$150,000,000 will be returned. Already the internal revenue bureau has begun distribution of revenue stamps which will bring in the \$5 tax on every barrel.

After midnight April 6, the legalized beverages may be sold in at least 14 states—Arizona, California, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Washington and Wisconsin.

It may be sold also in Connecticut, if an opinion expressed by Kenneth Wynne, executive secretary to Governor Cross, is followed.

While breweries got full steam up to supply the prospective demand, Dr. Doran made ready to send 650 field workers to the licensed plants.

These men will give the word on the night of April 6 when the beer trucks may leave at the zero hour for the retail establishments.

Regulations issued yesterday by the alcohol bureau permit the bottling of beer.

Mr. Roosevelt yesterday asked Attorney-General Cummings for a report on the status of federal prisoners convicted of beer sales.

A number of bills have been introduced in congress providing for the release of such prisoners.

(By Mrs. Alexander George.) DINNER AT NOON Breakfast. Orange Juice Cooked Wheat Cereal Cream Soft Cooked Eggs Bacon Coffee Bread Coffee Dinner. Roast Pork and Canned Sweet Potatoes Apple Sauce Bread Butter Head Lettuce Salad French Dressing Creamy Prune Pudding Coffee Supper. Bacon and Cheese Squares Orange Peel Bread Strawberries Pear Sauce Tea Creamy Prune Pudding. 1-3 cup sugar. 8 tablespoons flour. 2 egg yolks. 1/4 teaspoon salt. 1 cup rump pulp. 1 cup milk. 2 tablespoons lemon juice. 2 egg whites, beaten. Blend sugar and flour; add yolks, salt, rump pulp and milk; cool in double boiler until mixture is thick and creamy; stir frequently; fold in egg whites; cool; add lemon juice; chill.

Orange Peel Bread. 3 1/2 cups flour. 4 teaspoons baking powder. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1 cup chopped candied orange peel. 2 cups milk. 1 egg. 2 tablespoons butter, melted. 2-3 cup sugar. Soak milk and peel 15 minutes. Add rest of ingredients; pour into greased loaf pan; let rise 15 minutes. Bake 50 minutes in slow oven. Bacon and Cheese Squares. 12 square crackers. 2 tablespoons butter. 6 pieces bacon. 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Spread butter on crackers; top each cracker with piece of bacon; sprinkle with paprika. Arrange on shallow pan and bake 10 minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm.

An attempt is made to give a variety in foods, balance the lunches, and use the best of materials. The food is cooked by one of the cooking classes, under close supervision. One group of girls prepares and serves the lunch for which they receive their own lunch, while another group is paid in money. From 10 to 12 girls are employed during the school year.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Something may cause a change later, but so far President Roosevelt and the newspaper corps seem well satisfied with the informal, direct question and answer discussions at Mr. Roosevelt's semi-weekly press conferences.

ferences—abandoned since the early days of the Harding administration—Mr. Roosevelt laughingly said that he had been told they would not continue long. He ventured they could and would be carried out.

Some of the veteran reporters disagreed, but after several successful gatherings, they have changed their minds.

The procedure at the conferences on Tuesdays at 10 a. m. and Fridays at 4 p. m. are simple. The newspapermen waiting in the lobby of the executive offices are summoned into the President's room. They fill almost every available bit of space. Mr. Roosevelt greets them and leans comfortably back in his chair.

There is no hesitation in his answers. When he doesn't make a direct answer, he says: "I can't tell you anything about that yet," or "I don't know."

First off, Mr. Roosevelt tells the reporters whether the answers are "of the record," or "background," to be used on their own authority. Direct quotations are prepared in writing.

All in all, it is a free and easy, give and take exchange, with the President heartily enjoying the frequent quips and sallies.
