

SARAH ARTHURS, PIONEER WOMAN, PASSES, AGED 86

Sarah Arthurs, Oregon pioneer of 1853, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. R. Lamb, near Gold Hill on the Old Stage Road, Thursday at the age of 86.

She was born in Knoxville, Ill., and at the age of 6 years started with her parents by wagon train for Oregon. Forty wagons composed the train, but as they proceeded they became separated until there were but four families in the company.

Upon reaching Oregon, Mrs. Arthurs became a year or two as they crossed the Cascade mountains. It was here where the wagons were dismantled and left down over the rim rocks by ropes and tackle.

They came by Walla Walla, Wash., then a small trading post, and landed in Lincoln county, Oregon, where the town of Sheehow is now where her father took up a donation claim.

Sarah McAllister resided on the farm there until her marriage in 1862 to William Arthurs, and to them were born nine children. Ten years later they moved to Walla Walla, Wash. and came to Jackson county in 1868, making their home in the Applegate for many years and later in eastern Oregon. Upon their return, Mr. Arthurs died here in 1925, since which time she had resided with her children.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. D. E. Millard at the Congregational church at 2 p. m. Sunday. Interment in Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.
