### DEPRESSION CURES AIMED AT CHILD WELFARE IS CLAIM

There is a general tendency, prevalent throughout the nation, "to take the depression out on the children"—is the warning issued to the Jackson County Health association yesterday afternoon by Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis society. In an inspiring address at the home of Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the health association, she asked her audience of 100 not to let this thing happen, pointing out that the safety of the nation rests upon the education of its children.

There is a growing willingness on the part of school boards and taxpayers, she stated, to undermine the child's education. Twenty six per cent of the public schools have been closed in one state, in another 33 per cent are in process of closing. There is no guarantee that this tendency will not spread to Oregon if people are not on the alert to halt such a reaction. Mrs. Dunbar added, urging them not to become so immersed in their own affairs as to be oblivious to the national situation.

"Keep the ship of state as steady as possible for the future generation. We of our generation have not consulted the children about the mortgages we have put on them. If we neglect their needs during the years from six to ten we have robbed as well as mortgaged them," Mrs. Dunbar declared.

An interesting review of the three White House conferences was given by the speaker, who stressed the fact that it was not until the last conference that the handicapped child was brought into notice. He is now, she stated, the corner stone of welfare work. It is realized that every child should have the best opportunities for his potentialities. All children, regardless of color, creed and class are to be given consideration in the great scheme of things.

Need of a leader to come forth in the interests of the handicapped child was cited by Mrs. Dunbar in condemnation of the "pernicious" law, which allows the welfare association but 30 days to plan a child for adoption. Such a law, she described as unfair to both child and prospective parents.

There are many welfare problems yet to be solved in Oregon, she stated in closing, and the cooperation of churches, Parent-Teacher associations, health associations and all welfare groups is needed.

Occur E. Hoover, retiring Boy Scout executive in this district, was also a speaker on yesterday's health program. He voiced a demand for more trained leaders in recreational groups, stating that there is never a lack of boys and girls, but usually a lack of leaders. More community singing and other programs for children, whose leisure time is not properly cared for at home was asked by the scout executive.

Following the program tea was served by the Central Point committee, hostesses for the occasion.
