FATE OF AKRON STUNNING BLOW IN WASHINGTON

ried him and the other two survivors to Brooklyn navy yard.

A succinct story of navy heroism was contained in the last paragraph: "In lightning flash saw many men swimming. Wreckage drifted rapidly away. Discipline in control car perfect."

Wiley, Richard Dear, M. E. Erwin and Robert W. Copeland were picked up by the German tanker Phoenix which was attracted to the scene by what it thought to be fires. Copeland died after being taken aboard. Deal was taken to a hospital when the Tucker arrived at Brooklyn. His injuries were slight.

Radio Hampered The men were transferred to the Tucker early in the day so the Phoenix might stand by and search for wreckage or effect further rescue.

Static hampered the exchange of wireless messages during the storm, and only the coast guard station at Asbury Park, N. J., heard the S. O. S. of the Akron. Third naval district headquarters in New York reported its receivers "went dead."

Airplane and ship rescue efforts were hampered throughout the day by poor visibility and a flying ceiling that was close to the sea level.

The number believed to have been drowned makes the disaster the worst in the history of lighter-than-air flight.

A naval court of inquiry was assured and a congressional investigation seemed probable. Chairman Vinson of the house naval affairs committee asserted no more large airships would be constructed in America.

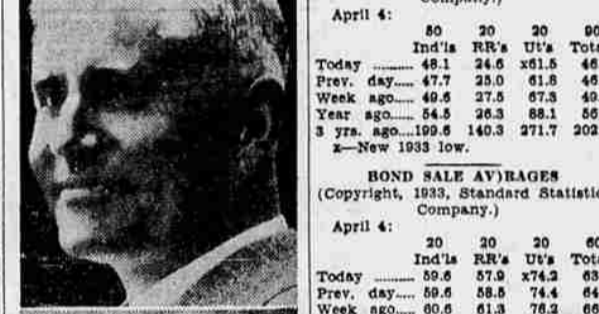
