## HARRY MILLS DIES AT DIETRICH, IDA.

Word was received in Medford the latter part of the week by Glenn O. Taylor of the death in Dietrich, Idaho, March 25 of Harry D. Mills, formerly well known mining engineer of Medford, who made his home here until about seven years ago.

Mr. Mills, who was prominent in southern Oregon, was associated for some time with Ed Trowbridge in the Medford Iron Works, and was also interested in numerous mining projects in the district, as well as timber holdings in the county.

He was a member of the Medford school board at one time, and constructed a fine home on the east side where he resided with his family before going to Idaho. While in the latter state, Mr. Mills was with the highway department of Idaho for some time.

Surviving him besides his widow, are three children, Elizabeth, Harriet and Neville.
