

BEER TO INCREASE CHEESE SALE SAYS KIWANIS SPEAKER

Increased consumption of a Rogue river valley product as a result of the legalization of beer was forecast today by C. M. Churchill, general manager of the Central Point cheese plant, who addressed the Kiwanis club at luncheon at the Hotel Medford. By putting a little more salt in the cheese, he stated, the thirst for more beer can be aroused. The satisfaction of the thirst will in turn arouse the desire for more cheese and so a prosperous circle for brewers and cheese makers will result.

The process of manufacture of the Central Point cheese was described to the club by Mr. Churchill and to make his description authentic, he gave each guest at the luncheon a sliver of the product.

The Central Point plant is now handling 600 gallons of milk a day in the manufacture of cheese, he stated, and is equipped to care for 2000 gallons. The plant was constructed to handle 4000 gallons of milk a day, which is the goal of the company.

NEW YORK, April 10.—(AP)—The spring rally in the stock market developed signs of bull hilarity today, as prices registered their sharpest gains in more than three weeks. Turnover expanded was 1,000,000 shares, and many issues pushed up 1 to more than 4 points.

Reports of quickened activity in the steel and automotive industries, the pre-Easter stimulus to retail trade, continued strength in commodity prices, notably wheat, copper and silver, combined with continued conjecture as to the prospect of controlled inflation, gave the new week in the securities markets a bright sendoff. Prices were strongest at opening and near the close, and final prices were around the best.

THOMAS TO TALK AT K. F. TUESDAY

SALEM, April 10.—(AP)—Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, upon invitation from Klamath Falls, will deliver an address there tomorrow night on utility control, he announced here today.

While investigation of the California and Oregon Power company rates and charges now under way in southern Oregon, has not been completed, Thomas said he would not discuss that individual condition. He said his talk would deal with what has been done with other firms based upon records of findings and facts. Investigation at Medford and Klamath Falls has again been renewed after a short suspension.

In his address Thomas said he would point out remedies for present conditions of high rates and services. He will leave tonight for Klamath Falls.

and fine. His admission that the proceedings were a farce and not founded on law, came as a surprise. Fehl at the time of the trial claimed he "knew more law than Judge Norton." His boom friend, L. A. Burke, wrote "He (Fehl) knows more law than all the lawyers."

Former County Judge Lamkin and Commissioner Burrell were charged with contempt and "mutilating the records," in the appointment of R. E. Nealon as commissioner, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of John Barneburg, December 31. The "mock trial" lasted three days, with the court packed with Fehl-Burke henchmen, with Fehl insisting that M. O. Wilkins act as his attorney, instead of the district attorney.

The trial was called as a political reprisal for the appointment of Nealon, which had been declared legal and valid by the state attorney-general. Fehl claimed the appointment was a "plot to tie his hands."

At one stage of the trial Walter Jones, mayor of Rogue River, now under indictment for ballot stealing, presented a petition demanding that Nealon resign.
