MERCHANDISING MOFFATT TOPIC FOR ROTARIANS

An intensely interesting talk on the problems of modern merchandising was given by John Moffatt of Mann's Department store at the regular weekly meeting of the Medford Rotary club today in the basement banquet room of the Hotel Medford. Business today was likened to a ship by Mr. Moffatt. Sailing along on the smooth waters during the bounteous days of prosperity, the ship of business has encountered the severe storms of recent depression times. The many errors and troubles in modern merchandising are like barges on the bottom of a ship and must be removed before smooth sailing is again enjoyed, he said.

One of the greatest fallacies in retail business during the past few years has been lack of care in purchasing on the part of the store buyers, Moffatt said. The store of today is the purchasing agent for its community. Now, more than ever before, a retailer must depend upon the good will of his trade, necessitating the utmost care in choosing his merchandise with the thought always in mind that his patrons must receive the finest quality merchandise and the very latest in style at real value-giving prices. Another important change which must be made by merchandisers today is to simplify sales system and concentrate on price groupings most appealing to the consumer. Mr. Moffatt considered legislation now under consideration in Washington to end the disastrous policies of "loss-leaders." Proposed bills will give the manufacturer the right to set the retail price of commodities, a correction of an important business trouble in the opinion of the speaker. Volume sales and quantity turnover of stocks do not necessarily spell profits and good business. Mr. Moffatt said. Statistics compiled by the Harvard school of business research show many concerns adopting the policies of volume and rapid turn-over are suffering more than their more conservative contemporaries.

The next regular meeting of the Rotary club promises to be an interesting one with a general round table discussion of Mr. Moffatt's talk. In this open forum, business men identified with the local club will exchange views on many important business questions.

Fast District Northwest Governor Henry Manny made a short talk on the conditions of club in the northwest. John Per invited the members and guests to enjoy the "shoot" scheduled to be held at the Medford Gun club trap next Sunday and Roland Hubbard called the Rotarians' attention to the sixth annual Oregon Home Products banquet which will be held Tuesday, April 18th. A fine dinner has been arranged. Mr. Hubbard said, and tickets will be available for 50 cents.
