

### RUSSIANS TESTIFY BRIBES GIVEN FOR SPYING, SABOTAGE

and one of the defendants, then was called to testify. He insisted Thornton gave the money as a loan. He added: "Dolgov never returned it and we wrote it off finally as a gift."

Both Thornton and William H. MacDonald, the only one of the Englishmen who pleaded guilty to the charges, asserted yesterday that confessions were obtained from them against their will. Thornton said he had obtained information in Russia which was merely essential to his company because of its investments.

Dolgov, a 30-year-old Russian official, precipitated the investigation of the British company by immediately turning over money he received from Thornton to the OGPU (secret police). He made a good impression as a witness with his direct, unhesitating answers.

#### Denies Asking for Money

He was dressed in a shiny blue suit and a white shirt. He was clean-shaven, sandy-haired, of medium height, broad-shouldered and with sharp blue eyes. The first witness aside from the accused to testify in the trial, Dolgov declared, feelingly: "Comrade Prosecutor: I am a soviet engineer and do not ask foreigners for money!"

#### Prosecutor Andrey V. Vishinsky

pressed him for an explanation. "The Metropolitan-Vickers equipment was not always in good condition and, in my opinion, the money was given me as a bribe," he said. "I never asked for it because I do not need money."

He said his salary was 550 rubles (about \$275) monthly and his wife's 100 rubles (about \$50).

Thornton said the confession he had signed was "useless to deny" when it was obtained from him by the Russian police. During his testimony yesterday the audience laughed when he declared he hoped to have a chance to correct the statements. When he called the judge "comrade" he was quickly corrected and informed to address him as "citizen judge."

#### Secretary on Stand

He denied a witness' statement that he obtained information concerning military products concerns served by the electrical equipment installed by the Metropolitan-Vickers company.

Anna Kutuzova, a blonde secretary engaged by Monkhouse, testified she heard the British engineers discussing plans to wreck machinery in soviet plants. She is one of the Russian defendants.

Shifting to alleged counter revolutionary acts at Zulevka electrical station on the eastern slope of the Ural mountains, the prosecution called M. L. Kottlyarevsky, one of the defendants. He is 29 years old and manager of the station's turbine section.

Kottlyarevsky declared MacDonald paid him 1000 rubles (about \$500) for plans for the enlargement of the station, to conceal defects of the Metropolitan-Vickers machinery and to damage one of the turbines.

#### Few Have Gramophone

"I was lonely there and MacDonald had a gramophone and we became friends," said M. L. Kottlyarevsky. Gramophones are highly prized in Russia.

"We talked about soviet power and policies," the Russian continued, "on his instructions I threw a piece of iron in generator number three which disabled the turbine for ten days."

MacDonald, questioned by the prosecutor, said he knew the incident occurred but he was not asked whether he ordered it.

### ABRAHAM LINCOLN ASSASSINATED 68 YEARS AGO TODAY

Sixty-eight years ago tonight in the Ford theater, Washington, D. C., the shot was fired which brought death to one of America's greatest men, leaving a nation not yet emerging from the terrors of civil war to face its most dangerous era without its leader, the one man in whom south as well as north recognized a humanitarian.

Abraham Lincoln, best known in the tributes of world writers as "Honest Abe," had been persuaded by family and friends to spend an evening at the theater. It was four days after the surrender of General Lee, the few people now living who experienced the events of that trying period, recall.

A bleeding people had turned for a few hours to the world of make-believe in an effort to clear their minds of the stern realities which had overburdened them for many months, and to celebrate the victory which had come to the wearer of the blue.

In his special box sat the president of the United States and his fam when the actor, John Wilkes Booth fired the fatal shot.

Pandemonium resulted, not only in the theater, but throughout the nation. Increased hatreds and universal mourning were added to the already multitudinous problem confronting America.

And the nation came out of it, the old soldiers who participated in the emersion, remark today, and laugh at the depression of recent months as they recall the sufferings of the late sixties, and the terror which reigned following the untimely
