The drought continued in the city of Medford today except at a few restaurants and lunch counters, whose proprietors motored to California yesterday to bring in small shipments of "Golden Glow," a brew from the Golden State. No beer was forthcoming from Portland, San Francisco or the east. The foam available was obtained from northern California wholesalers who got in large supplies in the beginning. Rumors that eastern beer had arrived faded away this afternoon when wholesalers and storage firms were questioned. They had no beer and made no predictions as to when they would have, stating that past promises had "got them into trouble" when the brew failed to arrive.

Recruiting and selecting the Jackson county quota for the federal forest conservation project has been delegated to the county relief committee by the department of labor, it was announced today by James H. Owen, chairman of the Jackson county relief committee, upon receipt of official advisement from Governor Julius L. Meier. The number to be selected has not been made known, Mr. Owen said. Arrangements have been made at the Medford relief headquarters in the city hall to register all applicants immediately, who meet the following requirements: The applicants must be unemployed destitute single men or single men that have dependents who are also destitute. The applicants must be residents of Jackson county and between the ages of 18 and 35. "All persons who can qualify under these requirements and want to take advantage of the forest conservation work should report for registration at the Medford relief headquarters at once," Mr. Owen stated. He added that "at this time we have no further information as to when or where the men will be assigned to work or the class of work or compensation. Complete instructions from the governor are to follow later."
