MODERN TEACHING AIDS ORIGINALITY AVERS EDUCATOR

The fruit of all work is art, and the greatest discipline is that which evolves from the desire of the individual to do great things—is the message brought to Medford last night by Mrs. Gudrun Thorne-Thomson, noted educator and author, in an inspiring address on modern education, in which she outlined the things which it should accomplish to make the world a more pleasant place in which to live.

Mrs. Thorne-Thomson spoke at St. Mark's Guild hall before an interested audience of parents and other townspeople and emphasized through her address the present need for development of individuality in the schools of America and awakening of the desire for creative art.

She described the work of the Ojai Valley school in California, with which she is associated, and several others of the modern vintage, as accomplishing this aim, which necessitates dealing in smaller numbers and at greater expense, practically confining such training to the private school in America.

The modern school, the speaker also pointed out, develops the desire for cooperation, the community spirit, which is needed to aid the individual in adapting himself to world conditions. It teaches children how to live as well as to add and subtract. Mrs. Thorne-Thomson was introduced by Alfred G. Carpenter and at the close of her address, in response to demands of her audience, exhibited many samples of creative work by pupils in the Ojai school.
