WALTON SUES ON CRASH INJURIES

Jesse Walton of the Eagle Point district yesterday filed suit against R. A. Miller, a salesman, and the C. E. Gates Auto company for \$15,579.95, for alleged damages sustained in an auto accident near the Reese creek school last July.

The complaint asserts that Miller placed the auto in the hands of Ralph Denmore, who invited Walton and other youths for a ride. It is alleged while going at a high rate of speed, the auto overturned on a curve near the Reese creek schoolhouse. Walton sustained injuries that kept him in the hospital for over a month.

The complaint alleges that Miller was negligent in allowing the Denmore youth to have the car, and that he should have inquired into his capabilities as a driver.

Representatives of the auto concern claim that Miller secured the use of the auto under representation that his father desired him to make a trip to town, and that the auto was the property of Miller, who was demonstrating the auto.

They further state that the auto company had no connection with the transaction, and that the car was insured with an auto insurance company.

Kidnap Plot Known

The Fargo Forum of April 9, contained the following item, an echo of the charge of O. L. Goss, local unemployed leader, that Goss plotted the kidnaping of two county officials, and a private citizen, as part of a desperate fantastic plot to seize control of Jackson county.

At Medford, Ore., one George Coddling, former Valley City man was to be kidnaped by a so-called "Good Government" congress. Ransom was demanded for his resignation.

MEANS SENTENCE UPHELD BY COURT

WASHINGTON, April 18.—(AP)—District of Columbia court of appeals today affirmed a sentence of 15 years imposed upon Gaston B. Means following his conviction on charges of stealing \$104,000 from Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean.

Means was convicted of having taken the money on his promise to effect the return of the kidnaped son of Charles A. Lindbergh. He was given \$100,000 in cash by Mrs. McLean and \$4000 more for expense.

Means' story before the court when he was tried was that he had given \$100,000 to a man who jumped on the running board of his automobile near Alexandria while he was en route from North Carolina to return Mrs. McLean her money.

He insisted he thought this man was acting as an agent for Mrs. McLean and he asserted that Mrs. McLean would know he was dealing with her agent.
