

UNIVERSITIES OF GERMANY BARRED TO JEW STUDENTS

Aryan Law Invoked to Degrade Jews—Move Made to Prevent Foreign Control, Hitler Announcement

BERLIN, April 20.—(AP)—The Aryan law, which bars nearly all Jews from civil service and degrades them to second-class citizenship, is being invoked in all German universities by Chancellor Hitler's cabinet.

Dr. Wilhelm Frick, Nazi minister of the interior, has drafted a law regulating admittance of Jewish students to universities and other institutes of the reich according to their ratio to the entire population. Another law will assure Nazi leadership of student organizations.

Chancellor Hitler's newspaper, Voelkischer Beobachter, announced the action was being taken to save the universities from "excessive foreign control," meaning Jewish.

The Aryan clause defines any person having one Jewish grandparent as a Jew. The only exceptions made under the civil service ban were Jews in state service before August 1, 1914, or those who served in the world war trenches or whose fathers or sons were killed in the war.

The cabinet's action establishes the new "cleansing" decrees.

NEW HIGHWAY MAY SIDESTEP YREKA

YREKA, Cal., April 20.—Yreka appears to be facing the possibility that the Pacific highway will not come through the city at all but be established on a route either west of the city or on the east side along Yreka creek. Dr. W. W. Barnham, state highway commissioner stated Tuesday that the engineers who have been surveying routes through the city for the purpose of making estimates on the various routes, are now surveying to the north of Yreka to determine the best route as regards connecting up with the present completed highway a mile north of town.

Dr. Barnham said that a survey of a route to the west of Yreka had been made some time ago, and that the findings of the engineers would probably determine the location of the highway through or past Yreka.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—(AP)—The railroad commission today authorized the Southern Pacific to discontinue passenger service between the California-Oregon state line near Tule lake, and Alturas.

GUADALAJARA, Mexico, April 20.—(AP)—Four Catholics were reported killed and several wounded today in a riot at the village of Santa Fe which developed when the authorities interfered with a religious ceremony.

GAS POISONING DANGERS LESSENED BY INSPECTION

Firm Mattress For Baby

PORTLAND, April 20.—(AP)—Appointment of T. Morris Dunne, Portland business man and sportsman, as a member of the state industrial accident commission to succeed the late Charles T. Early, was announced by Governor Meier late Tuesday. Early died April 10.

INTIMATE BANKS AND WIFE STAND TRIAL TOGETHER

The decision whether they will be tried together or separately, rests with L. A. Banks, former editor and orchardist, and his wife, Edith Robertine Banks, jointly indicted for first degree murder for the slaying of Constable George J. Prescott, on the morning of March 16th, while Banks was waiting service of a warrant on an indictment charging ballot theft. The two defendants have been advised by counsel, the matter is one for their own determination.

Friends of the accused intimate that they will face the Lane county jury, which will decide their fate, together. The trial is scheduled to start Monday, May 1, at Eugene. Oregon law gives them the right to decide, any time before the actual start of the trial. The state has announced it would try Banks first, in the event separate trials were asked.

Attorney T. J. Enright, one of the counsel for Banks, said yesterday that the defense would be founded upon the general plea of not guilty. Under this plea the defense will have the right to introduce evidence to show insanity, self-defense, "defense of the castle," and gives them a wide latitude in the matter of evidence. Under the general not guilty plea the defense can use one, or all of the possible defenses.

The defense attorney said that between 15 and 20 witnesses would be called in their behalf.

The state will contend that Banks acted with premeditation and without justification, that he was "legally sane" at the time of the firing of the fatal shot, that his spoken and written words, immediately after and before the murder, and his acts for the same period were rational and sane. Banks' notes to city and state officials, warning them of "bloodshed," and his statement to the state police, and in the Josephine county jail will constitute part of the evidence to be introduced against him at the trial.

Attorneys of the city and county see a similarity between the Banks case and that of Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, insofar as legal insanity is concerned. Dr. Brumfield, a Roseburg dentist, slew a hermit by the name of William D. Russell, to perpetrate an insurance hoax. He was convicted and sentenced to hang. Insanity was interposed as a defense.

In the Brumfield trial, the Oregon law covering insanity as a defense was carried to the state supreme court and upheld in a ruling on an appeal. The Oregon law holds that insanity when used as a defense must be sufficiently shown, as "detracting reason," and that eccentricities or delusions of the defendant is not insanity within the legal meaning of the term. The insanity under the Oregon law must be proved "beyond a reasonable doubt."

Because of the prominence of Brumfield in Douglas county and the fiendish premeditation involved in the murder of Russell, the trial attracted state and national attention. Brumfield was arrested in Canada, where he was employed as a farm-hand and made his escape by wearing women's garments.

Sacco-Vanzetti Judge Succumbs

BOSTON, April 20.—(AP)—Webster Thayer, the Massachusetts judge who pronounced sentence of death upon Nicholas Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, was dead today at the age of 75.

The jurist succumbed to a cerebral embolism, suffered Friday in his room at the university club here, and his condition had been too critical for him to be moved. His wife was with him from the time he was stricken.

LUMBER INDUSTRY MAY BENEFIT BY BRITISH EMBARGO

SEATTLE, Wash., April 20.—(AP)—A possibility that the embargo placed upon Russian lumber imports today by Great Britain may aid soft wood lumber export sales in Oregon and Washington and particularly British Columbia, was held out today in a statement by the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

The association, however, pointed out that Russia, denied the British market to which she sold 45 per cent of her exported lumber last year, may decide to "dump" the lumber elsewhere, threatening international lumber trade at other points.

The \$4 a thousand import tax on lumber levied by this country would not keep Russia from "dumping" a half billion feet of lumber in the states, if she wanted to, in the opinion of the association.

If the embargo is maintained, the association believes "it may be of great importance to the lumber industry of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, depending on the duration of the embargo and the amount of stock on hand in Sweden, Finland and Norway."
