

Dropping Gold Standard Not Expected to Swell Cost of American Living

Upturn in Staples to Bring Profit Motive Revival in Business Current And Restoration of Jobs

NEW YORK, April 21.—(AP)—What does it mean in dollars and cents? This was the question on innumerable lips today, not only those of butchers, bakers and candlestick makers, but of leading bankers, as markets were convulsed by news the United States had suspended the gold standard.

While clear answers to the question were lacking, pending development of Washington's controlled inflation program, it was agreed in many financial and economic quarters it should mean more jobs.

Whether the price rise coincident to reduced purchasing power of the dollar would mean appreciably higher costs of living was described as problematical. That, it was explained, would depend upon the levels at which prices are finally stabilized.

Great Britain, since abandonment of the gold standard there in 1931, has kept the cost of living relatively stable. That country's suspension of gold gave commodity prices only a momentary boost. But it helped England hold her prices in terms of her currency fairly stable, while gold prices in the United States and France continued their steady decline, with consequent further disturbance to business and employment.

Proponents of inflation—and inflation means raising prices through increasing the turnover of currency or credit or both—have held that slightly higher costs of living should be welcomed by the country at large, if it meant widespread gains in employment, and a check to the steady decrease in payrolls which the nation has endured.

In the main, bankers and economists who discussed the problem were not inclined to look for much increase in living costs.

It was pointed out the relapse in the dollar in terms of other currencies had effected chiefly the raw staples, which had declined much more sharply than the cost of living.

The actual gains thus far in commodity levels have been but a small fraction of the slump of the past three years.

It was hoped the upturn in staples, many of which have been quoted seriously below the cost of production, would bring the profit motive into play again, revive business, and restore jobs.

BIBLE LEADS SCIENCE IN GREAT DISCOVERIES DECLARES EVANGELIST

Evangelist Teddy Leavitt, conducting evangelistic meetings at the Christian church, spoke last night on the subject: "Science and the Bible." He said in part: "We sometimes hear the statement that there is conflict between science and the Bible and that the Bible will not stand the test of science.

"I wish to state that the Bible will stand the test of any scientific fact ever discovered. It may not stand the test of scientific theories, but it will. If the Bible had been in harmony with scientific theories of 50 years ago it would be out of date now. Facts do not change, but theories do. Too many teachers accept theories before they are proven facts.

"The Bible is not a text book on science and yet it contains scientific truths unknown to mankind for centuries. The Bible tells us the earth is round and hangs in space. These facts were not known by science until the time of Copernicus A. D. 1476, but they were recorded in the Bible over 2000 years before that. The Bible tells us that the air has weight Job 28:25.

"This statement was made 1800 B. C. No scientist before Galileo (1564 A. D.) was aware of that fact. After Lord Rosse invented his telescope, it was discovered that there was a great empty space in the northern heavens. In all other parts of the heavens stars were found, but here was a vast space without a single star. This was considered a great discovery. But the Bible proclaimed that fact 3500 years before science discovered it.

"For centuries scientists proclaimed that the moon was a luminous body like the sun. It was considered a great discovery when it was found that it did not shine of itself, but only reflected the sunlight. Job said in 1800 B. C., 'The moon, it shineth not.'
