

AMELIA ADVISES D. A. R. GO SLOW ON URGING ARMS

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—Speaking before the Daughters of American Revolution, who for years have been adopting resolutions calling for arms and navies for national defense, Amelia Earhart said today no organization should advocate armaments unless the members were willing to bear arms themselves.

The aviator said equally with men was essential in everything and asserted women should be drafted in event of war.

Mrs. Earhart said at present there are about 600 licensed women pilots compared to 18,000 men, exclusive of army and navy.

She then announced she would "touch on a point which this organization and myself do not see eye to eye."

"You are very much interested in the nation's defense through the army and navy," she said. "I feel that industrial development is just as important, and feel that a great number of industrial pilots is just as potent security as we have in a large army and navy."

She retold humorously the story of her historic solo flight across the Atlantic eleven months ago.

She paid high compliment to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who flew with her last night to Baltimore and back.

"The example set by the first lady of the land has done more to advance aviation, among women, I think, than any other factor," she said.

HOME MANAGEMENT HIGH SCHOOL CLASS APPEALS TO GIRLS

The process of learning the art of living centers in the home, and the kind of life one lives depends largely upon the type of home of which one is a member. The modern home as a center in community life, with the responsibility imposed upon each member.

Home furnishings, dealing with the artistic and utilitarian phases.

The care of the home, dealing with the care of the furnishings.

Budgeting the uses and abuses of money and how to keep accurate accounts.

The care and training of children, studying the physical, mental, and emotional sides of the child and learning how to deal most effectively with its physical and mental development and how to control the emotional nature with desirable habit formation.

LITTLE GIRL GETS CHEERING LETTER FROM ROOSEVELT

President Roosevelt, engrossed in his crusade to lift commodity prices and restore prosperity in the good old United States, still finds time for his little friends, between deflation conferences, currency issues, and the general round of crowded events, which have closed in on him since he entered the White House.

Little Mary Frances Holloway, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Holloway this city, will testify to that. She got a letter from the president this week. He wished her well and voiced the hope that she is continuing the exercises begun when she was a guest at Warm Springs, Ga., health resort sponsored and frequently visited by the president.

And her answer is "yes." She is continuing her exercises and steadily improving. With her new braces she can walk about town. And her legs, once of no use at all in satisfying her great desire to go places, are now enjoying quite a normal bone growth.

As spring advances Mary Frances is going to give more and more time to the exercises and health habits learned last year at Warm Springs, where she, like the president, realized a return of strength, taken from her by infantile paralysis.

In his master strokes, which have started and brought renewed faith to the nation since he became its president, Mary Frances finds inspiration to carry on the fight for a strong, healthy body.

DOGS AND CATS OFTEN VICTIMS HIT AND RUNNER

At least two dogs, cats or other animals every minute are victims of auto drivers, according to Mrs. H. D. McCaskey, president of the Jackson County Humane society. A conservative estimate has placed the number at well over a million a year, which means at least two every minute for each 24 hours a day and 365 days a year.

"We are going to make every effort not only during this 'Be Kind to Animals Anniversary' but at all times in the future, to impress upon automobile drivers that they must exert more care in avoiding mishaps to animals while driving," said the head of the local society.

"This wholesale slaughter of animals must be stopped if we have to prosecute all offenders. Courts have held that animals are entitled to the same consideration along the roads as are human beings and we are determined to see that they get it.

"Some of these mishaps are, of course, unavoidable. A dog or cat may at any time step in front of a speeding car and suffer injury or death. We ask in these cases that they be reported immediately to the local society so that proper disposal may be made of the killed or maimed animal.

"It is the hit-and-run driver we are anxious to bring to justice. There are two types of these. There is little to choose between them. There is no human more despicable than the driver who will deliberately run down a frightened dog, cat or chicken scampering across the road, and then turn in glee to see the extent of the damage he has caused.

"We are asking, not only this week, but throughout the year, that reports of injured animals be made promptly to the headquarters of our society. We would like the license number of the car that caused the accident, and the name and address of the party reporting the accident. It is the duty of everyone to co-operate in this way."
