

### HUBBELLS HURLING HOLDS GIANTS AT LEAGUE PINNACLE

#### 'Screwball' Artist Due for Highly Successful Season Is Prediction — One Run Allowed in 20 Innings

Give the New York Giants a few more pitchers like Carl Hubbell and they ought to create a lot of consternation among the rivals who have been confidently expecting them to come to rest somewhere in the depths of the National league's second division this season.

The signs so far point to a highly successful season for the southpaw "screwball" artist. The Giants have played three games; Hubbell has taken part in all of them and due largely to his efforts Bill Terry's team stands at the head of the class with two victories and a tie.

#### Allows One Run

In the absence of a "wrecking crew" it has required good pitching to win for the Giants and Hubbell's control during his 20 2-3 innings in which he has allowed 12 hits and a single run. He hurled eleven frames in the drawn battle with Brooklyn Sunday, came to the rescue in the last frame of Tuesday's struggle with the Phillies and retired the last two batters, and yesterday blanked Boston Braves with four singles for a 1 to 0 triumph.

#### Against the Braves

Hubbell fanned 13 men, including the last three sluggers to come up against him in the ninth and whiffed two dangerous hitters the only time a Boston runner got as far as third. The Giants got their single run off Fred Frankhouse in the sixth when George Davis clouted a triple and Hughie Critz singled him home.

#### Good Pitching Seen

Good pitching marked other National league games, which saw the Phillies hammer out a 10 to 2 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Chicago Cubs turn back the St. Louis Cardinals 3-1.

#### The Dodgers got only four hits off Jim Elliott and Frank Pearce but Elliott was wild and couldn't last. Pat Malone and Dizzy Dean granted six hits apiece in the Dub-Gard game. Dean however, tossed in a couple of wild pitches which were the only ones Pittsburgh's home opener against Cincinnati was rained out.

#### "Lefty" Grove set down the Washington Senators with four blows while Jimmie Fox led the Philadelphia Athletics to an 8-1 victory.

#### Detroit errors ruined a fine pitching duel between Clint Brown of Cleveland and Vic Sorrell of Detroit and decided it 3 to 1 in favor of the Indians.

#### Chicago's surprising White Sox moved into second place behind the idle New York Yankees with a 5-4 victory over the St. Louis Browns.

### STRANGLER SOCKS DERN FOR VICTORY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—Taking two falls out of three, one with the aid of his fists, Ed (Strangler) Lewis of Glendale, Calif., won the main event of last night's wrestling card here from Ira Dern of Salt Lake City. Lewis weighed 240 and Dern, 209.

Lewis applied a series of headlocks to win the first fall in 19 minutes. Dern evaded the count in less than three minutes with a flying mare. After six minutes of wrestling for the third fall, Dern roughed Lewis and the Strangler answered with a blow to the jaw that laid Dern out in the orchestra pit. Both men were outside the ring, but Lewis climbed back in before the count and was awarded the match when Dern did not return in time.

Bob Kruse, 210, Oswego, Ore., won from Bob Stone, 211, Chicago, in the semi-windup. Stone won the first fall, but was unable to return after Kruse took the second.

### RAMEY PROMISED SHOT AT CROWN

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 21.—(AP)—Wesley Ramey has won his chance at the lightweight boxing title his goal in the 74 fights of his professional career, of which he has won 70.

Tony Canzoneri, the title holder, promised him that chance last night, after taking a decisive lacing at the hands of the 23-year-old Grand Rapids contender in a 10-round non-title bout.

At the end of the fight, Canzoneri took a bow and announced that he considered Ramey ready for a shot at the title.

Ramey weighed in at 135, one pound over the limit. Canzoneri scaled 133. The Associated Press score card gave Ramey all but the first and third rounds, due to a fast left-hand sniping attack that reddened the champion's face from cuts over both eyes.

### CHILDERS, CAMPBELL LAND MANY FINE FISH

Fred Childers and J. L. Campbell were among successful fishermen of the week. Childers taking a number of big gamey steelhead on Evans creek and Campbell reeling in some fine trout. Childers got three Wednesday and four Thursday, the fish measuring around twenty-two inches.

Following their last encounter, the Californian claimed Frisbie gained the deciding fall by first knocking him down with a clout on the jaw. A few days later he challenged Frisbie to a battle with the gloves and, after some hesitancy, due to the fact that he knew Belcastro had some experience in that line of combat, the fireman today, according to the promoter, agreed to the bout.

Whatever the relative prowess of the pair at fistfighting, the fans are due for a gala evening as the affair will be a real grudge fight.

### WOMEN CAPTURE BIG CHINOOKS IN ROGUE NEAR G. P.

GRANTS PASS, April 21.—(Sp.)—More tales of salmon fishing and successful catches drifted into Grants Pass Thursday morning from the Rogue River lodge, owned by Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Martin of this city.

Mrs. Howard G. Martin of Burbank, Cal., who is visiting her father-in-law and mother-in-law landed one of the best Chinooks caught in that section of the river Wednesday evening when she dragged in a 35 pounder. It required one hour and thirty-five minutes of battling before the giant was brought to gaff. It was Mrs. Martin's first salmon.

At nearly the same time, Mrs. Margaret E. Wilson of Long Beach hooked a 28 pound Chinook and successfully landed the struggling fish on the river bank near the lodge. This was also Mrs. Wilson's first Chinook. Both of these fish were caught at nearly the same time and both are larger than the average Chinook. A 35 pounder is a day's work in any man's language, according to Mrs. Martin.

Three Californians S. G. Hawkins and C. T. Humphreys, both of Los Angeles, and George O. Day of Culver City, were quite lucky in their fishing attempts in the Rogue river below the city, Wednesday afternoon, according to reports given Joe Wharton.

After securing their anglers' licenses, the three men set out to land a salmon or two in the river near the city limits. At the close of the afternoon they reported hooking five and landing four, the largest of which weighed 35 pounds.

### DUCKS CHALK UP THIRD WIN OVER HOLLYWOOD, 6-5

#### Victory Puts Portland Outfit in Third Place — Hurlers Have Sad Day as Batters Hammer Offerings

After a day in which Coast league pitchers lost another round to batters of the circuit, Oakland and Sacramento today were still one-two in their drive for championship honors.

Hurlers from Los Angeles to Seattle took a beating yesterday with league sluggers banging out a total of 113 hits, an average of better than 28 a game.

Moving steadily up the league ladder, Portland marked up a third win over Hollywood, 6-5, and captured third place in the standings. Only a sensational catch by Eddie Mulligan, Beaver third baseman, saved the Oregon men from defeat in the ninth when the Stars rallied to score four runs. Ray Jacobs' four-bagger accounted for three of the tallies.

#### Seattle Wins One

Seattle finally ended the Missions' winning streak but had to overcome red leads three times before triumphing in a wild 10-inning game, 10-15. In the extra inning Alameda singled to second on Miller's sacrifice and went home on Cox's single for the final Seattle run.

As befitted the league leaders, Oakland contributed a generous 18 to the total while it was taking its third straight game from San Francisco, 10-5. The Seals made a contest of it until the seventh when the Oaks stepped up the pace with an attack that scored seven runs in the closing innings.

Lois McEvoy did the Acorn pitching and did a good job until the last inning when he eased up and let two Seals come home.

Sacramento made it three in a row over Los Angeles, 10-7, and maintained its second place position two games behind the Oaks. The Senators won the game in the ninth with a 4-run rally. Hitting honors went to Kam-
