GROWERS GIVEN CHEERY WORD BY VAN HOEVENBERG (Continued from Page One.) such a lien is satisfactorily established, funds will be forthcoming. will be made available to assure the production in the Medford district of not less than 3000 cars of fruit. This would mean that not less than one and one-half million dollars would be expended in the district for labor and materials between now and October first. Another equal amount will be expended for storage, freight and refrigeration, and the entire total will be brought into circulation from outside sources. Only a portion of the total amount will be the direct proceeds of loans, but the amount so obtained will permit the completion of a production program approximately as outlined. "I believe that we have finally reached a definite workable basis for action. The R. A. C. C. at Portland is keenly aware of the necessity of making funds available as soon as possible. Its members are earnestly desirous of extending such relief to the pear industry as they are permitted to do under the regulations imposed by the R. F. C. board at Washington, and the individual members of the Portland board are giving generously of their time in an effort to expedite action."

COUNTY'S CATTLE PASS TUBERCULAR INSPECTION TEST Bovine tuberculosis modified accreditation of Jackson county was completed today, according to E. R. Derflinger, department of agriculture, division of animal husbandry, who has been in Medford this week for the examination of the animals. He announced that the required quota had been tested, and that application will be made today to place this country in the accredited group. Applications for the certificate were sent the federal and state officials, and the recommendations must be accepted by them in order for a certificate to be given Jackson county. Federal modified tuberculosis accreditation means five-tenths of one per cent or less of tuberculosis in the cattle of the county, and according to Mr. Derflinger, the county may become eligible for creditation after a sufficient number of tests are made on all dairy cattle, and ten per cent of the grade female cattle of beef breeds. Mr. Derflinger pointed out that cattle from an accredited county may be transported anywhere without subsequent tuberculosis tests. The tests here have been carried on by county, state and federal officers, including Dr. F. H. Thompson of the bureau of animal industry, Dr. G. A. Gitzen, Jackson county veterinarian, and Mr. Derflinger. The work was started here last year, he said, with examinations for beef cattle. If the accreditation is allowed Jackson county, such acknowledgment is accepted by federal and state governments as well as the county. Such examinations as were completed here today, have been conducted in almost every county in the state, and will have been carried out in the remaining counties soon.

People are urged to investigate for themselves, and determine the falsity of sensational rumors, and not put themselves in a position again to be misled. Membership Checked. Claims that the membership of the "Congress" is returning are discounted by wholesale with-crawls. Authorities are said to be in possession of the membership cards, and are checking them against the written and oral withdrawals. Some of the membership remained "faithful." It is known that the "Congress" membership never exceeded the 1000 mark, though extravagant claims were made of five and six times that number.
