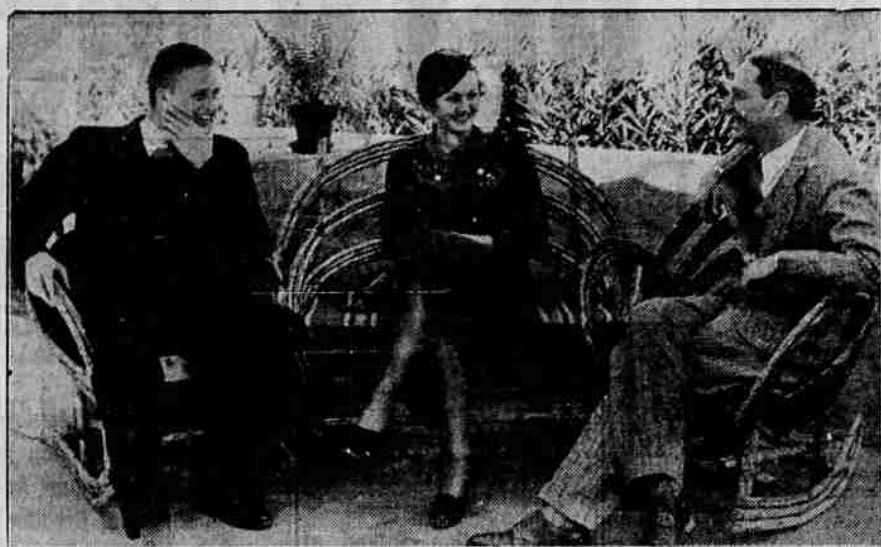
Messrs Seely and Flowers Hosts at Cards
