Lead marks left in the Columbia county mud.

Silverman, Abe Levin and Ed Francisco, alias "Prisco" Burke, are held as material witnesses without bail. All are known associates of Kodat, whose death from the bullet fired by Walker is believed certain.

Story Has Flaws

Detectives said they found a further discrepancy in Silverman's original account of his activities. He had declared he visited police headquarters at 7 p. m. Friday for a chat with officers, and that a half hour later he left to have his car washed. But police said today Silverman was not at the station after 4 p. m., and that he did not deliver his car to be washed until about 9:30 p. m., leaving more than five hours unaccounted for.

Police, physicians and Columbia county residents have tentatively placed the killing between 7 and 8 p. m. Friday. Several residents of the district said they saw the big motor car on the road at 7:45 p. m. The bodies were found Saturday morning.

Charges Await

District Attorney John L. Stroba of Columbia county, who has taken a firm and active direction of the gangster case, was informed on his arrival here today that James corpus action was contemplated with a view of obtaining the release of those held in jail here as material witnesses.

"Let them try it," he said quickly. "At the first move in that direction I will file first degree murder charges against them."

He declared he would continue to hold all those detained until his office can determine its course of action.

Crim, former Chiloquin pugilist, is well known to fight fans of Oregon. A middleweight, he has participated in bouts in all sections of the state.

Klamath Falls and Chiloquin especially have seen him in action many times during the past five years, and he has made appearances in Marshfield, Medford and eastern Oregon.

BANKS AND WIFE 'SPRUCE UP' FOR MURDER HEARING

to issue the order for their removal the last of the week.

Banks had another conference with his three attorneys yesterday. It is understood that Attorney William E. Phipps will handle the legal phases of the trial, requiring intimate knowledge of the law, and Attorney Joseph R. Hammerly of Portland, for many years a deputy Multnomah county prosecutor, will conduct the case before the jury assisted by Attorney Tom J. Enright, who is slated to make one of the closing pleas to the jury.

Lane county, where the trial will be held, is manifesting no undue interest in the proceedings, involving a murder in which they have no more than the normal curiosity that accompanies cases of a similar nature. The court has issued orders there will be no all-day parking in the courtroom, and no lunches therein during the noon hour, and the courtroom will be cleared at the close of each session. The crowd will be limited to the seating capacity of the room which has 225 seats.

The state has announced it will call 26 witnesses, and has most of the subpoenas served. The defense has not announced how many witnesses it will call, nor what its defense will be.
