Sacramento held a half interest in the Coast league's first place position today after making it three in a row over San Francisco yesterday while the heretofore pace-setting Oaks were faltering at Los Angeles.

After opening the first inning with a smashing six-run attack, the Missions had an easy time marking up their second win over Portland, 10-6. A walk, five singles and a double by Fitzpatrick gave the Reds their initial six runs. Cohen, Jacobs and Bowman followed Lou Koupal in succession in the Portland box after he was injured in the first inning by Eckhardt's liner. He was not hurt seriously. T. Pillette and Cole pitched for the visiting Missions.

Hollywood led Seattle by two runs when the ninth inning started, but was on the short end of a 6-3 score when the game ended.

15 SALMON TAKEN DURING MORNING AT SAVAGE DAM

According to a wire to The Mail Tribune from Rainbow Gibson, salmon fishing in Rogue river at Savage Rapids is now very good. Forty-one salmon were taken Thursday.

GRANTS PASS, April 28.—(Sp.)—Another fishing spurge hit the Rogue river in the vicinity of Grants Pass Wednesday morning when a total of 15 salmon were caught near the Savage Rapids dam at the Weasuku Inn piers within the fishing hours of the early morning.

Chief H. M. Wetherell of the Los Angeles fire department carried off top honors of the day when he caught his limit of three salmon within the short space of one and a half hours. The largest of the trio was 31 pounds. Although the chief's record was unparalleled, other sportsmen caught the 12 other chinooks reported by

Rainbow Gibson. This season's run seems to know no end, states Gibson. As soon as a slack day comes, the net three or four see the river teeming with salmon.

Other catches were reported in various sections of the river. Just below Grants Pass a number were taken Tuesday. Dan Baker pulled in a 25 pounder, and Jeff Wendel reporting another of 26 pounds.

The fish are reported to be unusually "fifty" this year, hundreds of dollars worth of gear having floated down the river to date.
