

VETERANS ADVISED AGAINST MARCHING

WASHINGTON, April 28.—(AP)—An appeal to former soldiers not to join in a new bonus march on Washington was issued today by Ernest Albright of Oklahoma City, who said he commanded the Oklahoma units of veterans that came here last year.

In a formal statement, approved by Senator Thomas (D., Okla.), and Representatives Patman (D., Tex.), and Rankin (D., Miss.), Albright said: "I urge upon all buddies who are really sincere and want to see the bonus paid, to think carefully before joining any movement which will hurt our cause."

Two former officers of the bonus army called at the White House with proposals of payment of the bonus to unemployed veterans, and said that unless this were done a call probably would be sent out for a new march on Washington.

CAMPUS RELIGION LEADERS AGREED

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—Orthodox Protestant and Jewish leaders of Oregon have found a common ground on which they can cooperate in the teaching of religion to students in the institutions of higher education in Oregon.

Positive declarations showing a united opinion as to the urgent need for definite moral and religious courses on the campuses of this state, were expressed at a meeting of Oregon religious and educational leaders here last night.

The meeting was under auspices of the Pacific division of the North American conference on higher education and religion. The faculties of the institutions of higher learning in Oregon, it was said, are eager to cooperate.

RED CROSS HONOR FLAG TO MONTANA

WASHINGTON, April 28.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today presented to Montana the honor flag of the American Red Cross for the greatest annual membership in 1932 per population.

Senator John E. Erickson, Montana governor during the roll call in which the flag was won, in receiving it told how the Red Cross helped Montana through its drought in 1931 and 1932.

Speaking to the annual convention, Mrs. Roosevelt expressed appreciation of the assistance the Red Cross had rendered the nation.

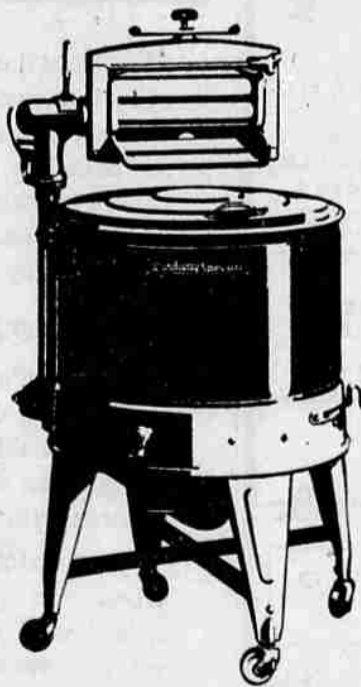
