

FARM AID SPURS STOCKS, WHEAT TO HIGH 1933 MARK

NEW YORK, April 29.—(AP)—Stocks, wheat and cotton were whirled up in another frenzied buying movement in the nation's principal markets today.

Overnight news of the senate's acceptance of the farm relief bill with the inflation rider, together with Washington assurances it would pass the house quickly prompted another "inflation boom" which swept prices of many securities and commodities to the best levels of the year or longer.

Wheat futures in Chicago surged up 5 to 6 cents a bushel to within a fraction of 75 cents. Cotton futures in New York swelled \$2 a bale, exceeding \$20 a bale for the first time since last September.

Prices rolled up \$2 to more than \$6 a share in the New York stock exchange in the most feverish trading for a Saturday session in three years.

Prices reached the best average level since September. In the bond market U. S. governments receded somewhat, but price averages reached the highest point in six weeks.

Silver, tin, copper, coffee, sugar, hides, cocoa, silk and rubber were among staples advancing substantially in future dealings.

Moody's early price index of 15 principal commodities reached the highest level since September and came within a shade of the 1922 peak.

STAGE ALL SET AT EUGENE FOR TRIAL OF BANKS

(Continued from Page One.) Banks planned flight after the killing, and had an auto ready to escape. The plan miscarried.

E. A. Fleming, Jacksonville orchardist, present in the Banks home at the time of the murder, was taken to Eugene Friday and will be one of the chief witnesses for the state, who also indicate they will introduce "two or three surprise witnesses."

Most of the Jackson county officials, including county officers, will leave early Monday morning for Eugene. The first day will be devoted to the jury. A panel of 48 new jurors has been drawn. The first witness is expected to be called by Tuesday afternoon and the trial finished by the end of this week.

Judge Skipworth yesterday issued an order directing Jackson county to pay \$1000 to Lane county for fees for defense witnesses. This money will not be advanced as proposed, and the court will pass upon the materiality of her testimony.

The court yesterday also refused to issue an order granting "to any group" reserved space in the courtroom. Attendance will be limited to 225 persons, the capacity of the courtroom, and it will be cleared after every session.

EMPLOYMENT HOLDS STEADY IN MARCH

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—(AP)—Employment held steady in Oregon during March, the Federal Reserve bank here reported today after its monthly survey. There was a decline in the total money payroll, due to lower average wages.

The seasonally adjusted index for employment stood at 53, compared with 59 in February, 57 in January and 54 March 1932. The payroll index, based on the 1925 monthly average as 100, was 92, compared with 97 in the preceding month and 41 in March 1932.

Actually there were increases both in employment and payrolls in the lumber industry, but they were less than seasonal. Activity declined in the textile and food products groups.

The Reserve survey, which is the most comprehensive made of employment conditions in the state, found the average wages in March were \$13.37 weekly. Food products workers who drew highest February pay, \$20.07, yielded in March to the paper and printing help, which averages \$20.52. The food products group averaged \$19.02 in March. Textiles \$17.40, metal workers \$16.71 and lumber and wood manufacturing workers, \$11.26.

RED SCHEEL STARS IN TENNIS TILTS

It took Red Scheel, Medford high school's fine all round athlete, just one set to get warmed up in the finals of the high singles tournament Friday. From then on it was a walk for the veteran number one who produced a burst of splendid tennis to run through the final two sets with the loss of only one game, and to capture the school title from the sophomore, Verne Campbell in straight sets, 7-5, 6-0, 6-1. The name of Scheel, one of the most distinguished in the annals of Medford's athletic life, will be the first to go down on the new Al Piche trophy.

As both finalists had gained the final bracket without the loss of a set a possible upset was anticipated but after gaining a slight margin in the first set's dueling Scheel rolled through the final two employing a smart assortment of strokes. Campbell, whose steady progress to the finals had been a surprise, staged a hard fight in the opening set but his lack of experience proved a handicap and he fell before some superior play. The exhibition that the All-State basketball player staged in the two final sets was as fine as has marked any final match and stood out as a possible good omen in the planned rehabilitation of Medford's tennis fortunes.

If the wind and rain that has persisted the past two days breaks the preppers are scheduled for a preview this morning then they take the court against the Medford Tennis club in what is also the club's initial appearance for this season. It promises a sorry start for the high youths as against the background of the match, the tennis club will parade six champions or former champions. Opposing this lineup a squad of twelve high school racket swingers has been named. They are: V. Campbell, Kroeschel, Brown, Cope, Gebhard, Hicks, Merrick, Hotell, Quisenberry, Rae, Applegate, Dudley, Holzgang, and Overmeyer.
