HOME FURNISHINGS LURE PETTY YEGGS

Petty thievery is becoming more common in Medford and the thieves are showing a special pen for household furnishings, is the report given yesterday by a number of landlords.

A sink was stolen last week from 728 Summit street and a number of other houses belonging to the state of Oregon have been entered and robbed. The thieves, if apprehended, agents in charge of the buildings stated, will be dealt with severely.

John Segedi, 39, of Arizona, and Z. T. McKinney, 32, of the same state, were arrested yesterday by Medford police for alleged shoplifting in Groceries No. 1, and appeared later in the day before Judge W. C. Coleman. Bail was set at \$250 for each and trials postponed until this week. The two men were still in jail last night.

Other arrests on shoplifting charges were predicted by city police officers, who announced that leniency extended by store proprietors to apprehend shoplifters is not encouraged by the police department and will not be tolerated in the future. 700 VOTERS HERE SIGN PETITIONS

Petitions, seeking a referendum on July 21 next, at the special election, on the oleomargarine tax, have been filed with the county clerk's office and have been checked. The petitions contain the names of 700 Jackson county residents—the majority from this city and Ashland, with a few from rural districts. Seven pe-

titions have been filed, each containing 100 names. The oleo tax bill referendum is sponsored by the Food Anti-Tax association of Portland. The oleo tax, as passed by the last legislature, provides a four cent per pound on oleomargarine, and 45¢ per year license for dealers. The tax would be proportioned among the various counties of the state, according to population, and used exclusively for indigent relief.
