SALEM, April 29.—(AP)—Charges of involuntary manslaughter were placed here this morning against Alloyus Godin 31, for the slaying of Gordon Lacy 17, east of Silverton yesterday when two hunting parties crossed paths. Stanley Carruthers 26, companion of Godin, and David Williams, 17, companion of the slain hunter, were each fined \$25 for hunting without licenses and Williams was given 30 days in jail for admitted theft of gasoline. Williams was under parole from the Multnomah county court for theft of an automobile.
